



Point-In-Time Count Committee

What is the Point-In-Time Count?

- The Point-in-Time (PIT) count is a comprehensive count of all sheltered and unsheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night within the last 10 days of January.
- The PIT Count is required by HUD and takes place every two years during the last 10 days of January. Methodology and timing for the count are determined by HUD. The 2024 PIT Count will be both sheltered and unsheltered.

The PIT Count will take place on January 23, 2024.

Responsibilities of a PIT Count Committee

The Point-in-Time Count Committee is responsible for coordinating a successful PIT Count, including identifying key encampment locations, providing valuable feedback for incentives and best practices, feedback regarding marketing opportunities and other publicity documents, and assisting in recruiting volunteers for the day of the PIT Count.

The PIT Count Committee will meet virtually *every week on Thursdays at 4PM.*

The first meeting of the PIT Count Committee is Thursday, November 30.
