
Many people only know the refinery by what they see driving by: an industrial oil operation with large equipment operating on the Nipomo Mesa. What they don't see and may not know is the way this refinery operates. Huge investment has been made in recent years to reduce the refinery's environmental impacts and the refinery works closely with the Air Pollution Control District and other regulators to assure the best in operations. Every single member of the refinery staff works with safety as his or her number one priority. Without question, refinery management and staff value safety and environmental considerations above refinery production. Refinery staff members are committed not just to their jobs, but to their community, volunteering time, money and passion to dozens of local organizations.

The issue at hand is approval of the draft EIR that will enable the refinery's rail project request. As you review the EIR and its suggested mitigations, I hope you will consider the project in its total context. The refinery is more than a collection of conditions and processes. It is a business that has been critically important to the local area for more than 60 years.

The EIR addresses the rail project specifically. It is not intended, nor should it be allowed, to become a line in the sand on overall oil policy or the statewide debate on California's energy future. The EIR stands on its own merit for a project that does the same. The EIR's recommended mitigations pave the way for project approval.

Please certify the EIR and move ahead with the rail project.
