I. Welcome and Introductions

The meeting was called to order at 3:05 pm. Introductions were made.

II. Approval of Minutes

There was a motion made by Patricia Ashbaugh and seconded by Ian Parkinson to approve the minutes from February. All in favor, motion carried.

III. Public Comment

No public comment.

IV. Programs Update

MIOCR- Drug and Alcohol received an extension for the date the report was due, it was submitted last week.

BHTCC- Star Graber distributed the March 2016 report. Four members of the collaborative

went to a grantee meeting that was held in Alexandria, Virginia the first week of March. Presentations given are listed on the handout. Please request additional information from Star on any you wish to review. Star was a member of the panel for the “Blending the Treatment Court Cultures” presentation and has the Powerpoint if anyone would like to see it.

There will be new evaluation tools released in spring, 2016. This will include Key Informant Interviews. Star gave a heads up that BHTCC workgroup members may be requested to provide program feedback to the federal evaluators via email.

Achievements for the first year of the grant include the following:

- Met all the grant deliverables including the 60 new program participants.
- Implemented the Assessment Coordinator role in the pre-dispositional court (felony).

Two goals for next year are:

- To enroll 60 new program participants and entering all new evaluation data and GPRAs on time.
- To increase our long term engagement in the BHTCC program by creating a recovery support phase for participants.

Star also announced the treatment court has a new judge, Gayle Peron, and the behavioral health treatment court clinician Keppi Serpa is now hired.

Robert Reyes reported briefly on the data collection project; he will set up a joint meeting with Probation, Sheriff and County Counsel to discuss the legalities of sharing data with Behavioral Health.

V. Treasurer’s report

Wendy White reported that at 3rd budget quarter closure she is predicting some programs will be a bit over budget and some under, but we will have some unspent monies at the end. We did receive the FY 2014-15 base restorative payment along with this year’s growth money from the state.

Beth Connor from County Office of Education spoke about Adult Education. Her area of expertise is with high school diplomas and GED. She is currently working with the jail special programs unit and they have created a program that mirrors the process and classes that students go through to get their diploma/GED on the outside. She has some flyers and handouts. Their program is offered county-wide and they do conduct a career exploration with students for community opportunities to job shadow, intern, and learn trade skills. Jim Salio suggested Probation tracking high school diplomas in their Monitor data system.

VI. Topics for next month’s meeting

Next meeting is scheduled for April 18th. If we have a light agenda, this meeting may be canceled. Next meeting date after that would be May 16.
