PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY ELECTION

Presidential Nominee Contest is "Party-Nominated"

- The Presidential Primary contest continues to be a partisan office, elected by voters affiliated with each party.
- Only those voters who are registered with a specific party can vote that party's ballot (with the exception of cross over voters – see below).
- Voters registered with a qualified political party cannot vote another party's ballot.
- Check on your voter registration status and party affiliation at www.slovote.com
- The rules for non-partisan contests (i.e. County Supervisor) did not change and will appear on every ballot.

Cross Over Voting

- The ballots are comprised of 6 different party ballots and a Non-Partisan ballot. Voters who are listed as No Party Preference (formerly Decline to State) voters can vote the Non-Partisan ballot (no Presidential race) or cross over and vote a party ballot from the <u>American Independent</u>, <u>Democratic</u>, and <u>Libertarian</u> parties only.
- To vote a <u>Green</u>, <u>Peace and Freedom</u>, or <u>Republican</u> party ballot, one must be registered with the respective party.
- Again, if you are already affiliated with one of the parties listed above, you will be issued that party's ballot.

Top Two "Voter-Nominated" Contests

- Applies to U.S. Senate, U.S. Congressional, Statewide and State legislative offices.
- All voter-nominated contests will appear on every ballot. Candidates, regardless of their party preference, will appear on a single combined ballot and voters can vote for any candidate from any political party.
- Only the two candidates who receive the highest number of votes cast in the Primary Election are on the ballot for the General Election.
- Write-in candidates are not allowed for these contests during the General Election.

Party Preference & Political Party Endorsement

- The political party preference, or no party preference, as indicated on the candidate's voter registration is listed next to or below the candidate's name on the ballot.
- The party designation shown is for the information of the voters only. It is not an endorsement by the party designated.

Parties may provide a list of candidates who have received the official endorsement of the party for printing in this booklet.

AN ORDINANCE CALLING FOR AN ELECTION WITHIN THE CAYUCOS FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT ("DISTRICT"), SAN LUIS OBISPO COUNTY, FOR THE PURPOSES OF SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE DISTRICT THE PROPOSITION FOR REPEALING THE PRIOR SPECIAL TAX AND APPROVING A NEW SPECIAL TAX FOR FIRE PROTECTION, FIRE PREVENTION AND OTHER FIRE DEPARTMENT SERVICES RELATED TO THE PROTECTION OF LIVES AND PROPERTY WITHIN THE DISTRICT

ORDINANCE NO. 2015-01

WHEREAS, pursuant to §§ 13800 et seq. of the California Health and Safety Code, the Cayucos Fire Protection District ("District") provides fire protection, fire prevention, and emergency medical or rescue services within the District boundaries; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance adopted December 5th, 2012 and subsequently approved by the voters within the District, there is currently imposed a Special Tax, (herein "2012 Special Tax") for fire protection, fire prevention, and emergency medical or rescue services within the District in the amount of \$25.00 per unit of benefit; and

WHEREAS, the 2012 Special Taxes have increased in fiscal years 2014/2015 and 2015/2016 as authorized in Subsection B; however the District Board of Directors has determined that the current proceeds from the 2012 Special Tax are inadequate to provide fulltime fire protection services related to the protection of lives and property within the District; and

WHEREAS, Article XIII C of the California Constitution, § 13911 of the Health and Safety Code and § 50075 et seq. of the Government Code authorizes the voters within the District to approve and adopt a Special Tax for fire protection services, rescue services, emergency medical services, and any other services relating to the protection of lives and property within the District; and

WHEREAS, the District Board of Directors has determined that the public interest in necessity demand that the special tax amount be increased so that the District is able to provide fulltime fire protection services for the protection of lives and property within the District; and

WHEREAS, the District Board of Directors desires to submit to the qualified voters of the District the question of whether to repeal the 2012 Special Tax and adopt a new Special Tax for fulltime fire protection services, rescue services, emergency medical services, and other services, including training, relating to the protection of lives and property within the District; and

WHEREAS, the District Board of Directors intends to impose the new Special Tax as authorized by this Ordinance only in the event that two-thirds (2/3's) of the qualified voters within the District approve the measure imposing the new Special Tax.

NOW THEREFORE, THE PEOPLE OF THE CAYUCOS FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>: **Imposition of Special Tax.** Except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance, a new special tax to fund fulltime fire prevention and protection services is hereby imposed on every parcel of land within the Cayucos Fire Protection District (District). The tax shall be imposed each fiscal year by the District Board of Directors to furnish fulltime fire prevention, fire protection, and other services as provided in Section 2 of this Ordinance. The tax imposed by this Ordinance shall be a tax upon each parcel of property, and the tax shall not be measured by the value of the property.

<u>Section 2:</u> **Special Tax Purpose.** The proceeds of the Special Tax imposed by this Ordinance shall be placed in a special fund for the purposes of obtaining, furnishing, operating and maintaining fire department equipment and/or apparatus, real property and facilities, for fire protection services, rescue services, emergency medical services, and other services, including training, relating to the protection of lives and property, for paying salaries and benefits to District personnel and for no other purpose.

<u>Section 3:</u> **Special Tax Account.** A special account shall be created in which the proceeds of the Special Tax shall be deposited.

Section 4: Special Tax Report. The District's Chief Financial Officer shall file an annual report with the District Board of Directors no later than January 1 of the year following the election and at least once a year thereafter, containing both of the following:

- A. The amount of the funds collected and expended; and
- B. The status of any projects or services authorized to be funded as identified in Section 2 of this Ordinance.

Section 5: Special Tax Amount. Subsequent to the end of each fiscal year, but prior to August tenth of the ensuing fiscal year, the Board of Directors at a public hearing, after considering public input, shall determine the precise amount of the Special Tax to be levied during the ensuing fiscal year, provided that such Special Tax will not exceed the maximum amount set forth in Section 6 below without the approval of two-thirds of the voters of the District voting on the question.

<u>Section 6:</u> **Maximum Tax Amounts.** The maximum amount of the tax imposed on each parcel of real property within the District pursuant to this Ordinance shall be determined as follows:

A. Commencing fiscal year 2016/2017 a maximum special tax rate of One Hundred Twenty-Five (\$125.00) per unit of benefit shall be imposed on each parcel in accordance with the following schedule to be adjusted each year thereafter not to exceed the increase authorized in sub-section B. below:

Example: As an example, a residential single family dwelling would be assessed four (4) benefit units at \$125.00 per unit for a total of \$500.00 in the tax year 2017/2018.

B. Commencing fiscal year 2017-2018 and each fiscal year thereafter, the special tax amounts specified by sub-section A above may be increased by the percentage by which the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers in the Los Angeles-Orange-Riverside area published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U.S. Department of Labor, or any successor to that index, increases in the twelve months prior to March of the year in which the adjustment is made. The District Fire Chief shall annually recalculate the maximum tax amounts pursuant to this sub-section B. and shall give notice of that determination to the District Board of Directors.

Section 7: Exemptions.

A. To the extent required by California and Federal law the following parcels shall be exempt from the tax imposed by this Ordinance:

- 1. Parcels owned by federal or state governmental agencies;
- 2. Parcels owned by local governmental agencies;
- 3. Parcels exempt from taxation by the District pursuant to the laws or constitutions of the United States and the State of California.

B. Any person or entity claiming an exemption from the tax imposed by this Ordinance shall file a verified statement of exemption on a form prescribed by the fire Chief prior to June 30th of the first fiscal year for which the exemption is sought.

<u>Section 8.</u> Administration and Appeals. The District Fire Chief shall administer this Ordinance. Appeals of any determination of the Fire Chief shall be submitted in writing to the District Secretary not later than July 1st of the fiscal year for which the tax is imposed. The District Board of Directors shall consider the appeal and issue a decision to the appellant in writing.

<u>Section 9.</u> **Amendment of Ordinance.** The District Board of Directors is hereby authorized to amend this Ordinance for the purpose of carrying out the general purposes of this Ordinance, to conform the provisions of this Ordinance to applicable state law, to permit the County Tax Collector or another public official to collect the Special Tax levied by this Ordinance in conjunction with County taxes, or to re-assign the duties of public officials under this Ordinance. In no event, however, may the District Board of Directors alter the provisions of Sections 5 or 6, of this Ordinance without the approval of two-thirds of the voters of the District voting on the question.

<u>Section 10.</u> **Special Tax Election.** Pursuant to the provisions of the Election Code and District Resolution 2016-01, it is ordered that this Special Tax Election be conducted pursuant to the uniform District Election Law commencing with Election Code § 10500 on June 7th, 2016.

Consolidation of Special Tax Election. Pursuant to § 1055 of 1) Section 11. the Election Code and District Resolution 2016-01, it is ordered that the Special Tax Election be consolidated with such other elections to be held on June 7th, 2016 under State law within the territory of the District, and shall be held and conducted, and all other proceedings incidental to and connected with the election, shall be regulated and done, in accordance with the provisions of law regulating regularly scheduled elections. The precincts, polling places for said precincts in the County of San Luis Obispo, and persons appointed and designated to serve as election officers for said election will be those determined, designated, and appointed pursuant to State law by the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk of the County of San Luis Obispo (the "Registrar"). The District, by Resolution, has requested that the election be consolidated with the Statewide Election and that the Registrar conduct the election as well as performs the various other services required by law on behalf of the District. The District has determined the full text of the measure shall be printed in the sample ballot booklet. The full text will also be posted and copies available at the District Office and on the County Clerk-Recorder's website and a copy of the full text will be mailed to any voter upon request.

<u>Section 12.</u> **Ballot Question.** Pursuant to the California Elections Code, the abbreviated statement of the proposition, as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"Shall Measure _____ be approved, which repeals the current 2012 Special Tax and imposes a new Special Tax at one hundred twenty-five (\$125.00) per unit of benefit, to be adjusted each year thereafter by the change in the consumer price index, for fire protection, rescue, emergency medical services, and other services relating to the protection of lives and property, and for no other purposes as provided in Ordinance 2015- 01".

<u>Section 13</u>. **Notice of Hearings.** In the absence of state law specifying the procedures for giving notice, notice of any public hearing held pursuant to this ordinance shall be given by publishing twice pursuant to Government Code Section 6066 in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation within the District. This notice shall include the date, time, and place of the public hearing, a general explanation of the matter to be considered, and a statement of where additional information may be obtained.

Section 14: **Collection of Special Tax.** The Special Tax imposed by this ordinance shall be collected by the San Luis Obispo County Tax Collector at the same time as and along with, and shall be subject to the same penalties and appeal process, as property taxes collected by said Tax Collector.

Section 15. **Two-Thirds Approval; Effective Date**. This Ordinance and the proposed Special Tax Increase shall be effective only if approved by two-thirds (2/3) of the voters voting thereon and shall go into effect ten (10) days after the vote is declared by the District. The new Special Tax, if approved, shall commence with Fiscal Year 2016/2017.

<u>Section 16.</u> **Notice of Holding Election.** Notice of the time and place of holding the election is given and the District Secretary is authorized, instructed and directed to give further or additional notice of the election, in time, form and manner as required by law.

<u>Section 17.</u> **Conduct of Special Tax Election.** In all particulars not recited in this Ordinance, the election shall be held and conducted as provided by law for holding Special Tax Elections. The District Secretary shall make this Ordinance readily available for public inspection.

<u>Section 18.</u> **Repeal of 2012 Special Tax.** Upon approval of this Ordinance as provided in Section 15 above, the 2012 Special Tax shall be repealed in its entirety.

<u>Section 19.</u> **Severability.** If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions of this Ordinance shall nonetheless remain in full force and effect.

Section 20. Recitals. That the recitals set forth hereinabove are true, correct and valid.

<u>Section 21.</u> **Effective date.** This Ordinance and the proposed Special Tax Increase shall be effective only if approved by two-thirds (2/3) of the voters voting thereon and shall go into effect ten (10) days after the vote is declared by the District. The new Special Tax, if approved, shall commence with Fiscal Year 2016/2017.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE C-16

This measure is intended to determine whether the special tax currently levied within the Cayucos Fire Protection District ("District") to fund fire prevention and protection services should be repealed and a new special tax imposed for the purposes stated in the measure.

Article XIIIC, section 2(d) of the California Constitution, Health and Safety Code section 13911, and Government Code section 50075 authorize the District to levy a special tax to fund the services set forth in Health and Safety Code section 13862, which include fire protection services, rescue services, emergency medical services and any other service relating to the protection of lives and property within the District, if approved by a two-thirds vote. The Board of Directors of the District ("the Board") has determined that revenue from a special tax approved by the voters of the District in 2012 to fund fire prevention and protection services is inadequate to fund the present needs of the District for these services. Therefore, the Board adopted Ordinance No. 2015-01 providing for the repeal of the special tax adopted in 2012 and the imposition of a new tax for the purpose of funding fire protection, rescue, emergency medical, and other services relating to the protection of lives and property within the District. In accordance with Article XIIIC, Section 2(d), the ordinance providing for the new tax will only become effective if approved by a 2/3rds vote of qualified voters.

If the measure is approved, the existing special tax of twenty-five dollars (\$25) will be repealed and, commencing fiscal year 2016-2017, a new special tax shall be imposed in an amount not to exceed the annual rate of one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125) per unit of benefit, to be increased annually thereafter only in accordance with increases in the consumer price index, as provided in the measure. The number of units of benefit applicable to the real property subject to the proposed new tax is set forth in the full text of the measure. In accordance with the terms of the measure, the Board will determine the precise amount of the tax to be levied during each ensuing fiscal year, provided that the tax shall not exceed the maximum authorized by the measure. If the measure is approved, the new special tax will be levied annually by the Board, and collected by the San Luis Obispo County Tax Collector in the same manner, along with, at the same time, and will be subject to the same penalties, as other property taxes collected by the Tax Collector.

A "yes" vote on this measure is a vote in favor of repealing an existing tax and imposing a new tax for the purposes of providing fire protection and prevention services within the District.

A "no" vote on this measure is a vote against repealing an existing tax and imposing a new tax for the purposes of providing fire protection and prevention services within the District.

The function of Cayucos Fire Department is to provide life safety and fire protection to the people and property owners of Cayucos. This requires adequate funding to supply the necessary equipment and personnel to address emergencies. A yes vote will enable your local district to continue to provide adequately staffed engines to respond.

Volunteer Fire departments are in decline nationwide, and this impacts Cayucos as well; as the demographics of the community have changed so has the ability to attract and retain volunteers. We are faced with the decision to transition to a full time paid fire department in order to meet the diverse and changing needs of the community and ensure adequate responses can be made to calls for service 24/7. The Cal Fire staffing contract for the winter months has become unsustainable with costs reaching nearly 50% of revenue. In order to meet the projected budget requirements for a full time department this bond measure is necessary for the future.

Timely response to an emergency is our highest priority and utilizing our own firefighters while maintaining local control through the elected officials of the Fire Protection Districts Board of Directors is our best option in order to maintain high standards and service delivery the community deserves.

Due to financial constraints we are faced with an equipment replacement problem needing to replace an engine immediately. We have foregone that replacement due to financial constraints.

This Board has reviewed alternative staffing and administrative possibilities, the least of which would cost the same as this measure requests while abdicating local control to the County. . Please vote YES on ballot measure C-16.
