DEVELOP A SAFE VOTING PLAN

To keep voters and election workers safe and limit the spread of COVID-19, voters are encouraged to vote the VBM ballot sent to them in the mail. The public health situation is serious, and the virus is expected to remain disruptive throughout this election season. By voting from home, you will ensure safety for not only yourself but others as well.

You can help keep voting locations safe for voters and election workers in these three ways:



Skip the Line

Return your voted Vote By Mail ballot **by mail** (no postage necessary), at a secure **VBM Ballot Drop Box**, or at a **Voter Service Center**, which will have separate lines for voters dropping off completed ballots.

Voters who can Vote By Mail will help ensure safe physical distancing at voting locations.

2 Vote Early

Voting locations will offer voter registration, replacement ballots, accessible voting machines, and language assistance for four days from October 31st to November 3rd, Election Day.

If you visit a voting location in person, **go before Election Day** to help maintain physical distancing and avoid lines.

Follow Safety Procedures

Protect your health and the health of other voters and election workers at voting locations by taking the following precautions:

Wear a face covering while at the voting location.

REQUIREMENTS FOR FIRST TIME VOTERS

The Help America Vote Act requires first time voters to show identification when voting. If you registered to vote by mail after January 1, 2003 and have not previously voted in San Luis Obispo County you may be required to show your current valid photo I.D. or a copy of one of the following that shows your name and address when you go to the polls on election day: Current Utility Bill, Bank Statement, Government Check, Government Paycheck, or a Government Document. The same requirement applies if you are voting by mail. You will be required to send a copy of one of the above with your voted Vote By Mail ballot. If you have questions about your status as a First Time Voter, contact us.

CITY OF PISMO BEACH IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE B-20

If approved by the voters, Measure B-20, entitled **"The Pismo Beach Public Safety and Community Services Protection Measure"**, would amend section 3.20.030 of the Pismo Beach Municipal Code to increase the City's transient occupancy tax rate from 10 percent to 11 percent.

The transient occupancy tax, sometimes known as a "hotel tax", is paid by visitors and others who stay for thirty consecutive days or less in the City's hotels, motels, vacation rentals and other similar lodging businesses. The lodging businesses then forward the tax to the City. The tax is not imposed on residents or property owners of the City unless they stay in the lodging businesses.

For example, if a hotel charges \$100.00 per night for a hotel room, the transient occupancy tax paid by the hotel guest under the current ordinance would be \$10.00. If the proposed measure is approved, the transient occupancy tax for the same hotel room would be \$11.00, or an increase of \$1.00 per night.

The revenues from the increased tax imposed by this measure would be deposited into the City's General Fund to be used for such general municipal governmental purposes as the City Council directs. Among such purposes are police and firefighter services, groundwater and beach protection, enhanced senior services and other essential City services. If approved, the additional transient occupancy tax revenue collected by the City is estimated to be \$1 million per year.

This measure is a general tax, and therefore, this measure will only become effective if approved by a majority of those electors voting on the measure. The transient occupancy tax cannot be increased again without voter approval. The transient occupancy tax was last increased in 1992.

A YES vote approves the measure.

A NO vote rejects the measure.

This measure was placed on the ballot by the City Council of the City of Pismo Beach.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE B-20

Measure B-20 would adjust the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) just 1% from 10% to 11% of the cost of a hotel/motel room. The TOT is paid for by tourists and visitors who stay in our hotels and motels; Pismo Beach residents do not pay this tax. The TOT is also applicable to short-term rentals.

Visitors use our roads, parks and emergency services as they enjoy all that Pismo Beach has to offer; from the beach, to our parks, to restaurants, shops and other amenities throughout our vibrant community. Raising the TOT represents a direct and fair way to recover the increased costs associated with visitor stays in Pismo Beach.

A modest 1% increase in the visitor tax will not hurt tourism and it does not place Pismo Beach out of market range. Tourists spend millions of dollars each year which sustains many local businesses. This, in turn, generates tax dollars that fund essential local government services. The proposed increase achieves an important balance between maintaining our competitiveness for tourism, while providing an opportunity to fund essential city services. The revenue from Measure B-20 will help fund critical services, and none of the money can be taken away by the State; all Measure B-20 revenue will stay local.

Please join us in voting YES on Measure B-20 and help our city build a stronger local economy and protect important city services.

San Luis Obispo County offers voters with disabilities options that provide for a private and independent voting environment. The San Luis Obispo County Clerk-Recorder wants to help you create a voting method that works for you. See your options below.

- Vote by Mail: You ballot has automatically been sent to you. Keep safe and return your ballot by mail, drop box, or Voter Service Center.
- Voting at a Voter Service Center: You can go to any Voter Service Center from October 31st to November 3rd. Locations are listed on the back of your Voting Instructions page.
- Accessible ballot-marking machines (ICX) are available at every Voter Service Center for four days of voting and at the County Clerk-Recorder's Office 29 days prior to the election for early voting.
- Curbside voting: If you arrive at a Voter Service Center and cannot get to the voting area, ask for assistance.

Remote Accessible Vote by Mail

A new voting experience can be provided by the elections staff for all Vote By Mail voters, including those with disabilities by using web-based tools on a personal computer, printer, and one's personal assistive device(s) (screen readers, tactile switches, closed captioning, sip and puff system, etc.) to access and mark one's ballot, then returning it by mail to the Elections Office.

WHY YOUR BALLOT WOULD <u>NOT</u> BE COUNTED

- 1. Ballot arrives after the deadline.
- 2. The VBM Return Envelope is not signed.
- The signature on the VBM Return Envelope does not match the signature on the voter's Affidavit of Registration.
- 4. The ballot is returned without the I.D. Return Envelope.

VBM Cure Process: New legislation requires the Election Office to send letters to voters who forgot to sign their return envelope or whose signatures did not match their signatures on file so their ballots can be validated and counted.
