- Your OFFICIAL BALLOT and your Voter Information Guide are contained in this VBM packet.
- This will be the only official mailing from the County.
 There is no sample ballot in this booklet since your
 OFFICIAL BALLOT is included. If you desire a copy of the
 ballot, refer to instructions on the next page or contact us
 and one will be provided.
- The deadline for return of VBM ballots is 8:00pm, Tuesday, November 3, 2020. You can:
 - Return your ballot by mail. Be sure it is postmarked on or before Election Day. No postage necessary.
 - Return your ballot in person to the Clerk-Recorder's offices, or to any VBM Ballot Drop Box located in the County listed in the Voting Instructions.
- During the four days of voting between October 31 November 3, return your ballot or vote in person at a Voter Service Center, also listed in your Voting Instructions.

- **3.** You can then print the sample ballot and mark it before your final voting on your VBM ballot.
- **4.** Bringing a completed sample ballot is recommended if you decide to vote at a Voter Service Center during the final four days of voting. Locations will be open from October 31 November 3.



DEVELOP A SAFE VOTING PLAN

To keep voters and election workers safe and limit the spread of COVID-19, voters are encouraged to vote the VBM ballot sent to them in the mail. The public health situation is serious, and the virus is expected to remain disruptive throughout this election season. By voting from home, you will ensure safety for not only yourself but others as well.

You can help keep voting locations safe for voters and election workers in these three ways:

Skip the Line

Return your voted Vote By Mail ballot by mail (no postage necessary), at a secure VBM Ballot Drop Box, or at a Voter Service Center, which will have separate lines for voters dropping off completed ballots.

Voters who can Vote By Mail will help ensure safe physical distancing at voting locations.

2 Vote Early

Voting locations will offer voter registration, replacement ballots, accessible voting machines, and language assistance for four days from October 31st to November 3rd, Election Day.

If you visit a voting location in person, **go before Election Day** to help maintain physical distancing and avoid lines.

Follow Safety Procedures

Protect your health and the health of other voters and election workers at voting locations by taking the following precautions:

VOTING LOCATION SAFETY CHECKLIST



Wear a face covering while at the voting location.



Keep 2 arms' length distance from other people.



Use hand sanitizer before entering and after leaving a Voter Service Center.



Bring your own ballpoint pen to avoid touching high-contact surfaces.

REQUIREMENTS FOR FIRST TIME VOTERS

The Help America Vote Act requires first time voters to show identification when voting. If you registered to vote by mail after January 1, 2003 and have not previously voted in San Luis Obispo County you may be required to show your current valid photo I.D. or a copy of one of the following that shows your name and address when you go to the polls on election day: Current Utility Bill, Bank Statement, Government Check, Government Paycheck, or a Government Document. The same requirement applies if you are voting by mail. You will be required to send a copy of one of the above with your voted Vote By Mail ballot. If you have questions about your status as a First Time Voter, contact us.

JOHN LAIRD

Occupation: California Secretary for Natural Resources

Education and Qualifications: This past March, I received strong support from voters when I ran on a platform that called for dramatic steps to tackle climate change, the affordable housing crisis, the goal of universal healthcare coverage and the need for a more sustainable public education system. Our world has changed in unprecedented ways since then. We are now deeply challenged by a pandemic, the bottom dropped out of our economy, and high-profile incidents of racial injustice have shaken our nation. ATASCADERO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FULL TEXT OF MEASURE C-20

INTRODUCTION

The following is the abbreviated form of the bond measure:

"To expand vocational/career education facilities for programs including engineering, technology, robotics, construction trades and agricultural science; improve school security/student safety; upgrade school emergency preparedness; build additional school facilities as needed; and create local construction jobs; shall Atascadero Unified School District's measure be adopted authorizing \$40 million of bonds with legal interest rates, levies averaging less than five cents per \$100 assessed valuation for 14 years (\$3.3 million/year for bond repayment), annual audits and independent oversight?"

BOND AUTHORIZATION

By approval of this measure by at least 55 percent of the registered voters voting on the measure, the Atascadero Unified School District will be authorized to issue and sell bonds of up to \$40 million in aggregate principal amount at interest rates not to exceed legal limits and to provide financing for the specific types of school facilities projects listed in the Bond Project List described below, subject to all the accountability requirements specified below.

ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS

The provisions in this section are specifically included in this measure in order that the voters and taxpayers in the District may be assured that their money will be spent wisely. Expenditures to address specific facilities needs of the District will be in compliance with the requirements of Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3), of the State Constitution and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000 (codified at Education Code Sections 15264 and following.)

Evaluation of Needs. The School Board has identified detailed facilities needs of the District and has determined which projects to finance from a local bond. The School Board hereby certifies that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction, enrollment growth, and information technology needs in developing the Bond Project List shown below.

Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee. Following approval of this measure, the Board of Trustees will establish an Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee, under Education Code Sections 15278 and following, to ensure bond proceeds are expended only on the types of school facilities projects listed below. The committee will be established within 60 days of the date when the results of the election appear in the minutes of the School Board.

Performance Audits. The School Board will conduct annual, independent performance audits to ensure that the bond proceeds have been expended only on the school facilities projects listed below.

Financial Audits. The School Board will conduct annual, independent financial audits of the bond proceeds until all of those proceeds have been spent for the school facilities projects listed below.

Government Code Accountability Requirements. As required by Section 53410 of the Government Code, (1) the specific purpose of the bonds is set forth in this Full Text of the Measure, (2) the proceeds from the sale of the bonds will be used only for the purposes

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specified in this measure, and not for any other purpose, (3) the proceeds of the bonds, when and if issued, will be deposited into a building fund to be held by the San Luis Obispo County Treasurer, as required by the California Education Code, and (4) the Superintendent of the District shall cause an annual report to be filed with the Board of Trustees of the District not later than January 1 of each year, which report shall contain pertinent information regarding the amount of funds collected and expended, as well as the status of the projects listed in this measure, as required by Sections 53410 and 53411 of the Government Code.

NO TEACHER OR ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES

Proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this measure shall be used only for the purposes specified in Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3), those being for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and the acquisition or lease of school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses.

STATE MATCHING FUNDS

The following statement is included in this measure pursuant to Education Code Section 15122.5: Approval of this measure does not guarantee that the proposed project or projects that are the subject of bonds under this measure will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by this measure. The District's proposal for the project or projects described below may assume the receipt of matching state funds, which, if available, could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure.

INFORMATION ABOUT ESTIMATES AND PROJECTIONS INCLUDED IN BALLOT

Voters are informed that any estimates, averages or projections in the bond measure, ballot materials and ballot label, including relating to estimated or average tax rates, the duration or term of issued bonds and related tax levies and money raised annually from tax levies to repay issued bonds are provided as informational only. Such amounts are estimates and are not maximum amounts, caps or limitations on the terms of the bonds, the tax rates or duration of the tax supporting repayment of issued bonds. Such estimates depend on numerous variables which are subject to variation and change over the term of the District's overall facilities and bond financing plan, including but not limited to the amount of bonds issued and outstanding at any one time, the interest rates applicable to issued bonds, market conditions at the time of sale of the bonds, when bonds mature, timing of project needs and changes in assessed valuations in the District. As such, while such estimates, averages and approximations are provided based on information currently available to the District and its current expectations, such estimates and approximations are not limitations and are not binding upon the District.

BOND PROJECT LIST

Scope of Projects. Bond proceeds will be expended on the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities of the Atascadero Unified School District, including furnishing and equipping, and the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries or other school operating expenses, in compliance with California Constitution Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3). This measure authorizes bond projects to be undertaken at all current and future District sites and campuses including:

School Facility Project List. The items presented on the following list provide are the types of projects authorized to be financed with voter-approved bond proceeds. Examples included on this list are not intended to limit the broader types of projects described and authorized by this measure. The types of projects authorized are:

- Expand the District's vocational/career education programs and facilities, such as engineering, technology, robotics, construction trades, and agricultural
- Upgrade classrooms and educational facilities with up-to-date computers and technology
- Repair and replace roofs
- Make improvements to facilities for emergency preparedness and enhanced security
- Meet handicap accessibility (ADA) requirements in restrooms and classrooms
- Upgrade and replace outdated heating, ventilation, and air-conditioning (HVAC) systems
- Repair, renovate and modernize outdated and aging classrooms and school facilities throughout the District
- Install solar and other energy cost saving systems
- Renovate restrooms throughout the District
- Upgrade playfields and athletic facilities throughout the District
- Replace the swimming pool on the high school campus
- Renovate or construct a multipurpose/cafeteria facility on the high school campus

<u>Furnishing and Equipping/Incidental Costs Authorized</u>. Each of the bond projects described in this Bond Project List include the costs of furnishing and equipping such facilities, and all costs which are incidental but directly related to the types of projects described above.

Examples of incidental costs include, but are not limited to: costs of design, engineering, architect and other professional services, facilities assessments, inspections, site preparation, utilities, landscaping, construction management and other planning and permitting, legal, accounting and similar costs; independent annual financial and performance audits; a customary construction contingency; demolition and disposal of existing structures; the costs of

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interim housing and storage during construction including relocation and construction costs incurred relating to interim facilities; rental or construction of storage facilities and other space on an interim basis for materials and other equipment and furnishings displaced during construction; costs of relocating facilities and equipment as needed in connection with the projects; interim classrooms and facilities for students, administrators, and school functions, including modular facilities; federal and state-mandated safety upgrades; addressing unforeseen conditions revealed by construction/modernization and other necessary improvements required to comply with existing building codes, including the Field Act; access requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act; costs of the election including of legal counsel; project construction oversight, management and administration during the duration of such projects, including by District personnel, and bond issuance costs.

Scope and Nature of Projects. Unforeseen conditions may arise during the course of planning, design and construction resulting in the scope and nature of any of the specific projects described above being altered by the District. In the event that the District determines that a modernization or renovation project is more economical for the District or otherwise in the District's best interests to be undertaken as new construction, this bond measure authorizes said new construction, including land acquisition, relocation, expansion and construction and/or reconstruction, and all costs relating thereto. In addition, this measure authorizes the acquisition of real property, including necessary rights of ways or other real property interests. required to expand District facilities, to provide access to school or other District facilities, or to provide additional school or related facilities. Further, authorized projects include reimbursements for project costs previously paid and paying and/or prepaying interim or previously obtained financing for the types of projects included on the project list. Finally, projects on this list may be undertaken and used as joint use projects with other public agencies.

Bond Funds Limited; Projects Not Listed In Order of Priority. Approval of the District's bond measure does not guarantee that all of the identified projects identified on the Bond Project List will be funded beyond what can be completed with funds generated by this bond measure. The project list may include projects which are not funded with bond proceeds. The District plans to pursue funds from the State of California, if available, to complete certain of the identified facilities projects. The District is unable to anticipate all unforeseen circumstances which may prevent some of the projects listed above from being undertaken or completed. The order in which projects are listed in the foregoing Bond Project List does not suggest an order of priority. Project prioritization is vested in and will be determined by the District Board of Trustees.

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IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE C-20

Bonds are financial instruments used to borrow money. Under the California Constitution, school districts may issue bonds if approved by at least 55 percent of voters within the boundaries of the district who are voting on a measure to authorize the issuance of bonds. The bonds are sold to the public and constitute a debt of the district. The principal and interest on the bonds are repaid by an annual property tax levy on all real property within the jurisdiction of the school district, calculated on the current assessed value of each property ("an ad valorem tax").

The Board of Trustees of the Atascadero Unified School District ("the District") has placed Measure C-20 on the ballot, proposing the sale of bonds in an amount not to exceed \$40 million. The District's Tax Rate Statement, included in the voter information guide, which was mailed to voters of the District, reflects an estimate of the maximum property tax levies required to service the bonds.

As legally required, proceeds from the sale of the bonds (i.e., funds generated by the bonds) may only be used for the purposes identified in the measure, including such things as: expansion of certain programs and facilities; improving, repairing, and upgrading classrooms and educational facilities; repairing, renovating and modernizing outdated classrooms and facilities and technology; installing energy cost-savings systems; upgrading of facilities for emergency preparedness and enhanced security; and upgrading athletic grounds and facilities (all as more fully described in the full-text of the measure). The law prohibits the use of bond proceeds to pay for teacher and administrator salaries or other operational expenses.

Approval of the measure does not guarantee that all proposed projects of the District to be improved with bond proceeds will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by the measure. The District's proposal for the projects may assume the receipt of matching state funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure.

As required by law, the District must follow certain accountability provisions to oversee the funds collected and expended, including the establishment of an independent Citizens' Oversight Committee, the annual completion of Performance and Financial Audits, and an annual report detailing proceeds received by the sale of the bonds and expenditures made, all requirements of which are reflected in the full text of measure.

The District's Tax Rate Statement provides the District's best estimate of the highest tax rate to be levied at an approximate rate of no more than six cents per \$100 (\$60 per \$100,000) of assessed property value per year. The final fiscal year in which the tax is anticipated to be collected is 2034-35.

A "Yes" vote on this measure is a vote in favor of the issuance of \$40 million in general obligation bonds to be used for the purposes set forth in Measure C-20.

A "No" vote on this measure is a vote against the issuance of \$40 million in general obligation bonds for the purposes set forth in Measure C-20.

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TAX RATE STATEMENT FOR MEASURE C-20

An election will be held in the Atascadero Unified School District (the "District") on November 3, 2020, to authorize the sale of up to \$40,000,000 in bonds of the District to finance school facilities as described in the measure. If such bonds are authorized and sold, principal and interest on the bonds will be payable only from the proceeds of *ad valorem* tax levies made upon the taxable property in the District. The following information is provided in compliance with Sections 9400-9404 of the Elections Code of the State of California. Such information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the District, and other demonstrable factors.

Based upon the foregoing and projections of the District's assessed valuation, the following information is provided:

- 1. The best estimate of the average annual tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on a projection of assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$0.043 per \$100 of assessed valuation (or \$43 per \$100,000 of assessed value). The final fiscal year in which it is anticipated that the tax will be collected is 2034-35.
- 2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, based on a projection of assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$0.060 per \$100 of assessed valuation (or \$60 per \$100,000 of assessed value). It is estimated that the year in which the highest tax rate would apply is in fiscal year 2021-22.
- 3. The best estimate of the total debt service, including the principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is approximately \$46.5 million.

Voters should note the estimated tax rate is based on the assessed value (<u>not</u> market value) of taxable property on the County's official tax rolls. In addition, taxpayers eligible for a property tax exemption, such as the homeowner's exemption, will be taxed at a lower effective tax rate than described above. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills and tax advisors to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

The attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates only, which amounts are not maximum amounts or durations and are not binding upon the District. The actual debt service, tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary from those used to provide the estimates set forth above, due to factors such as variations in the timing of bond sales, the par amount of bonds sold and market interest rates available at the time of each sale, actual assessed valuations over the term of the bonds, and other factors. The date and amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on the need for project funds and other considerations. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold will depend on conditions in the bond market at the time of sale. Actual future assessed valuations will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

CITY OF ATASCADERO FULL TEXT OF MEASURE D-20

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ATASCADERO, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING TITLE 3 OF THE ATASCADERO MUNICIPAL CODE TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 18 "ESSENTIAL SERVICES TRANSACTIONS AND USE TAX" TO BE ADMINISTERED BY THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF TAX AND ADMINISTRATION, SUBJECT TO ADOPTION BY THE ELECTORATE

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Revenue & Taxation Code Sections 7251 *et seq.* and 7285.9, the City of Atascadero ("City") is authorized to levy a Transactions and Use Tax for general purposes, subject to voter approval and

WHEREAS, the City proposes to levy a Transactions and Use Tax for general purposes to fund maintain and enhance important City services, with the rate set at one percent; and

WHEREAS, the City is fiscally challenged and while it does well with the funding that it has, general fund revenue growth has not kept pace with the increasing costs of providing services to a growing population; and

WHEREAS, the City seeks to maintain essential services and is coming to a crossroads where it cannot sustain the services it provides with the projected available resources; and

WHEREAS, one of the two fire stations protecting lives and property within the City's approximately 26 square miles was built in 1951 and has critical safety deficits requiring replacement; and

WHEREAS, the City, has approximately half the national average of police officers per capita for a City its size, is amongst the lowest paying City employer in the County for most positions, and has deteriorating infrastructure including fire stations, parks, roads, zoo facilities and other buildings; and

WHEREAS, Atascadero receives the lowest revenue per capita in Sales Tax, in Property Tax and in General Fund revenues among all San Luis Obispo County cities and money from a local, voter-approved funding measure is needed at the local level to address the community's local needs; and

WHEREAS, the proceeds from such transactions and use tax could not be taken by the State and would remain local, to be spent in the City of Atascadero for services such as police, fire, paramedic, parks, recreation, public facilities, infrastructure and other services; and

WHEREAS, all City revenues are subject to annual independent audits with public review of the City's budget being widely available, including at City Hall, and online; and

WHEREAS, under applicable law, to enact a transactions and use tax, the City Council of the City of Atascadero must approve the Essential Services Transactions and Use Tax Ordinance and the voters of the City of Atascadero must also adopt it upon majority vote at an election.

NOW THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ATASCADERO HEREBY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

- **SECTION 1.** <u>Title and Text</u>. This Ordinance shall be known as the Essential Services Transactions and Use Tax Ordinance, the full text of which is set forth in Attachment "A," attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- **SECTION 2.** Approval by City Council. Pursuant to California Revenue Taxation Code Section 7285.9, this Ordinance was duly introduced on July 14, 2020 and approved upon second reading for placement on the ballot by a two-thirds (2/3) supermajority of all members of the City Council on August 11, 2020.
- **SECTION 3.** Approval by the Voters. Pursuant to California Elections Code Section 9217, this Ordinance shall be deemed adopted and take effect only if approved by a majority of the eligible voters of the City of Atascadero voting at the Regular Election on November 3, 2020, and shall be deemed adopted and take effect ten (10) days after the City Council has certified the results of that election by resolution.
- **SECTION 4.** Operative Date. "Operative Date" for the Essential Services Transactions and Use Tax means the first day of the first calendar quarter commencing more than one hundred ten (110) days after the effective date of this Ordinance, as set forth in Section 3, above.
- **SECTION 5.** <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the Ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.
- **SECTION 6.** <u>Summary.</u> The title and a summary of the Ordinance, along with the names of the City Council members voting for and against the Ordinance, shall be published twice in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Atascadero.
- **SECTION 7.** <u>Publication.</u> The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance no later than fifteen (15) days following the passage of this Ordinance, and shall cause this Ordinance to be published by title and summary.
- **PASSED AND ADOPTED** by the City Council of the City of Atascadero, California, held on the 11th day of August 2020, by a vote of at least two-thirds of the City Council.

3-18.010 Title.

3-18.170

This chapter is designated and shall be known as the Atascadero Essential Services Transactions and Use Tax Ordinance. The city of Atascadero hereinafter shall be called "City." This ordinance shall be applicable in the incorporated territory of the City.

3-18.020 Operative Date.

"Operative Date" means the first day of the first calendar quarter commencing more than 110 days after the adoption of this chapter, the date of such adoption being as set forth below.

3-18.030 Purpose.

This chapter is intended to achieve the following, among other purposes, and shall be interpreted liberally in order to accomplish all of its lawful purposes:

- A. To impose a retail transactions and use tax to be applied throughout the entire territory of the City to the fullest extent permitted by law and in accordance with the provisions of Part 1.6 (commencing with Section 7251) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code and Section 7285.9 of Part 1.7 of Division 2.
- B. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that incorporates provisions identical to those of the Sales and Use Tax Law of the State of California insofar as those provisions are not inconsistent with the requirements and limitations contained in Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.
- C. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that imposes a tax and provides a measure that can be administered and collected by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration in a manner that adapts itself as fully as practicable to, and PR-9220-3 SL 004-026

requires the least possible deviation from, the existing statutory and administrative procedures followed by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration in administering and collecting the California State Sales and Use Taxes.

- D. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that can be administered in a manner that will be, to the greatest degree possible, consistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, minimize the cost of collecting the transactions and use taxes, and at the same time, minimize the burden of record keeping upon persons subject to taxation under the provisions of this chapter.
- E. To provide transaction and use tax revenue for unrestricted general revenue purposes, and not for specific purposes. All of the proceeds from the tax imposed by this chapter shall be placed in the City's general fund and be available for any legal municipal purposes.

3-18.040 Contract with State.

Prior to the operative date, the City shall contract with the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration to perform all functions incident to the administration and operation of this chapter; provided that, if the City shall not have contracted with the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration prior to the operative date, it shall nevertheless so contract and in such a case the operative date shall be the first day of the first calendar quarter following the execution of such a contract.

3-18.050 Transaction tax rate.

For the privilege of selling tangible personal property at retail, a tax is imposed upon all retailers in the incorporated territory of the City at the rate of 1% of the gross receipts of any retailer from the sale of all tangible personal property sold at retail in said territory on and after the operative date.

3-18.060 Place of sale.

For the purposes of this chapter, all retail sales are consummated at the place of business of the retailer unless the tangible personal property sold is delivered by the retailer or his agent to an out-of-state destination or to a common carrier for delivery to an out-of-state destination. The gross receipts from such sales shall include delivery charges, when such charges are subject to the state sales and use tax, regardless of the place to which delivery is made. In the event a retailer has no permanent place of business in the State or has more than one place of business, the place or places at which the retail sales are consummated shall be determined under rules and regulations to be prescribed and adopted by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration.

3-18.070 Use tax rate.

An excise tax is hereby imposed on the storage, use or other consumption in the City of tangible personal property purchased from any retailer on and after the operative date for storage, use or other consumption in the territory of the City at the rate of __1% of the sales price of the property. The sales price shall include delivery charges when such charges are subject to state sales or use tax regardless of the place to which delivery is made.

3-18.080 Adoption of provision of State law.

Except as otherwise provided in this chapter and except insofar as they are inconsistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, all of the

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provisions of Part 1 (commencing with Section 6001) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code are hereby adopted and made a part of this chapter as though fully set forth herein.

3-18.090 Limitations on adoption of State law and collection of use taxes.

In adopting the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code:

- A. Wherever the State of California is named or referred to as the taxing agency, the name of the City of Atascadero shall be substituted. However, the substitution shall not be made when:
- 1. The word "State" is used as a part of the title of the State Controller, State Treasurer, State Treasury, or the Constitution of the State of California;
- 2. The result of that substitution would require action to be taken by or against this City or any agency, officer, or employee thereof rather than by or against the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration, in performing the functions incident to the administration or operation of this chapter;
- 3. In those sections, including, but not necessarily limited to sections referring to the exterior boundaries of the State of California, where the result of the substitution would be to:
- a. Provide an exemption from the taxes of this chapter with respect to certain sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not otherwise be exempt from this tax while such sales, storage, use or other consumption remain subject to tax by the State under the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, or;
- b. Impose this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property, which would not be subject to tax by the State under the said provision of that code.
- 4. In Sections 6701, 6702 (except in the last sentence thereof), 6711, 6715, 6737, 6797 or 6828 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.
- B. The word "City" shall be substituted for the word "State" in the phrase "retailer engaged in business in this State" in Section 6203 and in the definition of that phrase in Section 6203.
- 1. "A retailer engaged in business in the District" shall also include any retailer that, in the preceding calendar year or the current calendar year, has total combined sales of tangible personal property in this state or for delivery in the State by the retailer and all persons related to the retailer that exceeds five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000). For purposes of this section, a person is related to another person if both persons are related to each other pursuant to Section 267(b) of Title 26 of the United States Code and the regulations thereunder.

3-18.100 Permit not required.

If a seller's permit has been issued to a retailer under Section 6067 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, an additional transactor's permit shall not be required by this chapter.

3-18.110 Exemptions and exclusions.

A. There shall be excluded from the measure of the transactions tax and the use tax the amount of any sales tax or use tax imposed by the State of California or by any PR-9220-5 SL 004-028

city, city and county, or county pursuant to the Bradley-Burns Uniform Local Sales and Use Tax Law or the amount of any state-administered transactions or use tax.

- B. There are exempted from the computation of the amount of transactions tax the gross receipts from:
- 1. Sales of tangible personal property, other than fuel or petroleum products, to operators of aircraft to be used or consumed principally outside the county in which the sale is made and directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property under the authority of the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government.
- 2. Sales of property to be used outside the City which is shipped to a point outside the City, pursuant to the contract of sale, by delivery to such point by the retailer or his agent, or by delivery by the retailer to a carrier for shipment to a consignee at such point. For the purposes of this paragraph, delivery to a point outside the City shall be satisfied:
- a. With respect to vehicles (other than commercial vehicles) subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with Section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, and undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code by registration to an out-of-City address and by a declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, stating that such address is, in fact, his or her principal place of residence; and
- b. With respect to commercial vehicles, by registration to a place of business out-of-City and declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, that the vehicle will be operated from that address.
- 3. The sale of tangible personal property if the seller is obligated to furnish the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the operative date of this ordinance.
- 4. A lease of tangible personal property which is a continuing sale of such property, for any period of time for which the lessor is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by the lease prior to the operative date of this chapter.
- 5. For the purposes of subparagraphs (3) and (4) of this section, the sale or lease of tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.
- C. There are exempted from the use tax imposed by this ordinance, the storage, use or other consumption in this City of tangible personal property:
- 1. The gross receipts from the sale of which have been subject to a transactions tax under any state-administered transactions and use tax ordinance.
- 2. Other than fuel or petroleum products purchased by operators of aircraft and used or consumed by such operators directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property for hire or compensation under a certificate of public convenience and necessity issued pursuant to the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government. This exemption is in addition to the exemptions provided in Sections 6366 and 6366.1 of the Revenue and Taxation Code of the State of California.

- 3. If the purchaser is obligated to purchase the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the operative date of this ordinance.
- 4. If the possession of, or the exercise of any right or power over, the tangible personal property arises under a lease which is a continuing purchase of such property for any period of time for which the lessee is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by a lease prior to the operative date.
- 5. For the purposes of subparagraphs (3) and (4) of this section, storage, use, or other consumption, or possession of, or exercise of any right or power over, tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.
- 6. Except as provided in subparagraph (7), a retailer engaged in business in the City shall not be required to collect use tax from the purchaser of tangible personal property, unless the retailer ships or delivers the property into the City or participates within the City in making the sale of the property, including, but not limited to, soliciting or receiving the order, either directly or indirectly, at a place of business of the retailer in the City or through any representative, agent, canvasser, solicitor, subsidiary, or person in the City under the authority of the retailer.
- 7. "A retailer engaged in business in the City" shall also include any retailer of any of the following: vehicles subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with Section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, or undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code. That retailer shall be required to collect use tax from any purchaser who registers or licenses the vehicle, vessel, or aircraft at an address in the City.
- D. Any person subject to use tax under this ordinance may credit against that tax any transactions tax or reimbursement for transactions tax paid to a district imposing, or retailer liable for a transactions tax pursuant to Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code with respect to the sale to the person of the property the storage, use or other consumption of which is subject to the use tax.

3-18.120 Amendments.

All amendments subsequent to the effective date of this chapter to Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code relating to sales and use taxes and which are not inconsistent with Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, and all amendments to Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, shall automatically become a part of this chapter, provided however, that no such amendment shall operate so as to affect the rate of tax imposed by this chapter. The City Council may amend this chapter to comply with applicable law or as may be otherwise necessary in order to further the chapter's stated purposes.

However, as required by Article XIII C of the California Constitution, voter approval is required for any amendment that would increase the rate of any tax levied pursuant to this Chapter. The people of the City of Atascadero affirm that the following actions shall not constitute an increase of the rate of a tax:

A. The restoration of the rate of the tax to a rate that is no higher than that set by this Chapter, if the City Council has acted to reduce the rate of the tax;

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- B. An action that interprets or clarifies the methodology of the tax, or any definition applicable to the tax, so long as interpretation or clarification (even if contrary to some prior interpretation or clarification) is not inconsistent with the language of this Chapter; or
- C. The collection of the tax imposed by this Chapter even if the City had, for some period of time, failed to collect the tax.

3-18.130 Enjoining collection forbidden.

No injunction or writ of mandate or other legal or equitable process shall issue in any suit, action or proceeding in any court against the State or the City, or against any officer of the State or the City, to prevent or enjoin the collection under this chapter, or Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, of any tax or any amount of tax required to be collected.

3-18.140 Severability.

If any provision of this chapter or its application to any person or circumstance is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unlawful, unenforceable or otherwise void, that determination shall not effect on any other provision of this chapter or the application of this chapter to any other person or circumstance and, to that end, the provisions hereof are severable.

3-18.150 Effective date.

This chapter relates to the levying and collecting of the City transactions and use taxes and shall take effect 10 days after the election results are declared by the City Council (CA Elections Code §9217). The operative date (Section 2) will be the first day of the first calendar quarter commencing more than 110 days after the adoption of this ordinance, which will be April 1, 2021.

3-18.160 Termination and repeal.

The authority to levy a retail transaction and use tax shall be in effect until and unless repealed by the voters of the City in the manner provided by law.

3-18.170 Independent annual financial audit.

The revenue and expenditures of this new transactions and use tax shall be included in the annual audit of the City's financial operations by an independent certified public accountant.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE D-20

The City Council has placed on the ballot the question of whether to approve an ordinance adopting a transactions and use tax within the City of Atascadero. The ordinance would add a transactions and use tax at the rate of one percent (1%) of the retail sales price, or one cent for an item that costs one dollar, until and unless repealed by the voters of the City.

This measure would authorize an additional 1% (one percent) transactions and use tax, which would increase the total sales tax rate within the City of Atascadero to 8.75%. The City Council and staff estimate the 1% (one percent) transactions and use tax increase would result in additional revenue to the City of Atascadero of approximately \$4.5 million annually until repealed by the voters.

This tax on retail sales is paid by non-residents as well as residents. Certain necessities of life, including purchases of food or medicine, are exempt from the tax.

Because this measure does not legally restrict the use of tax revenue to any specific purposes, it is classified as a "general tax," not a "special tax." The tax proceeds will be locally controlled and may be used for any valid municipal government purpose, including but not limited to, fire protection, paramedics, and 911 emergency response, police, crime prevention and investigations, maintenance of parks, public facilities and infrastructure, graffiti removal, and recreation, community services, and other general city services. Further, the tax proceeds will be subject to annual independent audit to ensure the funds are properly spent.

Currently, the tax on retail sales within the Atascadero is 7.75% of the purchase price. Technically, the existing 7.75% "sales tax" is a combination of the State of California Bradley-Burns Uniform Local Sales and Use Tax Law of 7.25% and the Atascadero Transactions and Use Tax of 0.5% authorized by the voters in 2014. The Atascadero Transactions and Use Tax expires on March 31, 2027. Both are levied on the sale or use of tangible personal property sold at retail. Retailers collect the tax at the time of sale and remit the funds to the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration, which administers the tax.

A "Yes" vote is a vote in favor of the tax. A "No" vote is a vote against the tax. This measure will be approved if it receives a simple majority of "Yes" votes. If this measure is approved, the total sales tax rate within the City of Atascadero will increase to 8.75%. If this measure is not approved, the total sales tax rate within the City of Atascadero will remain at 7.75% until the City's existing transactions and use tax rate of one-half percent (0.5%) expires on March 31, 2027.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE D-20

The City of Atascadero seeks to maintain essential services for residents. After years of deferring big expenses, the City has reached a crossroads: the money it expects to receive isn't enough to keep paying for the services residents need and expect. Atascadero gets less tax revenue than any other City in the County -- about half as much as Paso Robles. The City of Atascadero has insufficient funds for fire protection, paramedics, 911 responses, police and crime prevention. It has deteriorating infrastructure including parks, a 70-year old fire station, and aging facilities and roads. People expect services that Atascadero doesn't and can't provide. New businesses and hotels will help, but economic growth alone can't generate enough in taxes to fill the gap.

To address this need, your City Council voted unanimously to put Measure D-20 on the ballot to add a one-cent local sales tax. Atascadero receives only 1.5% of the current 7.75% sales tax. Sales taxes are paid by visitors and workers as well as residents. They are based on consumption -- those who spend more will pay more. The extra tax won't apply on necessities such as rent, groceries, medicine and services.

Additionally:

- The funds cannot be seized by the state. They must be spent locally in our community.
- Nearby Cities are voting on similar measures, so businesses here won't be at a competitive disadvantage.
- Many Atascadero residents already pay higher sales taxes when they buy things elsewhere – and none of that money comes to Atascadero.
- An independent audit will be performed every year providing accountability and transparency.

A Yes vote would mean more locally controlled revenue for essential City services and would be crucial in preserving and enhancing our community's quality of life.
