

Background

- Request for Applications released by State in January, due in April
- Focus: Expand implementation of bridge housing to address immediate and sustainable housing needs of people experiencing homelessness who have serious behavioral health conditions
- Short-term (less than 90 days) and mid-term housing (90 days-2 years)
- Prioritize and support access to services; reach historically underserved
- Provides funding for housing and services not covered under other funding



Background

 Prioritize Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Program* participants, when implemented (SB 1338, Umberg, 2022)



- County of SLO may apply for:
 - Up to \$5 million for operations and services
 - Up to \$2 million for purchase and renovation of existing structures
 - Can expand existing program (expand capacity), add new housing, or both
- First round allocation to County: \$7.5 million over four years (FY 23-24 through FY 26-27)

^{*}New State program focused on people with untreated schizophrenia spectrum or other psychotic disorders who meet specific criteria to prevent institutionalization and ensure appropriate care; referrals made to courts and participants receive a CARE plan: https://www.chhs.ca.gov/care-act/



Allowable Uses of Funds

TRACK 1: Operations

- Bridge Housing Outreach and Engagement
- Housing Navigation (required for all BHBH participants)
- Bridge Housing
 - Shelter/interim housing
 - Emergency shelter, transitional housing, recuperative care, crisis housing, recovery housing, motel-based sheltering, and/or community re-entry and diversion housing
 - Rental assistance
 - Auxiliary funding in assisted living facilities




Allowable Uses of Funds

TRACK 2: Start-Up Infrastructure (requires concurrent Track 1 application)

- Max of \$75,000 per bed
- All start-up infrastructure funded activities must be complete and beds available within 1 year of contract execution
- State encourages innovative models:
 - Hotels/motels
 - Modular buildings
 - Tiny homes
 - Master-leased units or buildings
 - Scattered sites



Behavioral Health Continuum of Care



Coordinate services across continuum for Bridge Housing participants



Implementation Options



- Expand existing Bridge Housing program
 - Rental assistance
 - Licensed housing facility (transitional housing) with 24/7 supervision
- Work with other housing/service providers to expand other programs
- Create new Bridge Housing



Behavioral Health Gaps Analysis San Luis Obispo County (Capstone, 2023)

- Certain elements of a comprehensive continuum do not exist such as crisis residential housing
- Other elements of the continuum exist but capacity is insufficient:
 - Adult residential facilities (board and care), sober living programs, higher levels of care in programs for substance use disorders (e.g. residential)
- Recommends investing in crisis residential treatment programs, licensed adult residential treatment programs, collaborating with sober living homes to expand substance use disorder services in outpatient programs; augment services



County of San Luis Obispo Behavioral Health Strategic Plan (2024)


- Investigate development of Behavioral Health and Substance Use Disorder residential treatment facilities for youth (13-18) and women
- Identify and collaborate with partners to increase adult access to longer term sober living program and board and care compatible with Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)
- Continue to expand access to affordable community housing for Behavioral Health clients transitioning from residential treatment, especially individuals living with SMI
- Continue to collaborate with Law Enforcement, Probation, and Wellpath to ease transition of incarcerated individuals to stepdown models of transitional care with wraparound supports & housing



Local Data: Homelessness in SLO County


2022 Homeless Point-in-Time Count

- 1,448 individuals experiencing homelessness on a given night
 - Capacity to shelter 20-30%
- Top health conditions survey respondents reported:
 - Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (46%)
 - Psychiatric or emotional condition (43%)
 - Drug or Alcohol Abuse (35%)
 - Chronic health problems (31%)
- 282 individuals counted as chronically homeless

Local Plan: San Luis Obispo Countywide Plan to Address Homelessness 2022-2027

Line of Effort 1:

Create affordable and appropriately designed housing opportunities and shelter options for underserved populations. (Goal: Create 300 units within 3 years).

• Initial Focus:

- People with behavioral health conditions, chronically homeless, older adults/medically vulnerable.
- Master leasing, non-traditional housing/shelter.

Line of Effort 2:


Housing stability for those experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness, including expanding prevention/diversion, supportive services, and housing navigation efforts.

Initial Focus:

Services to support new interim housing.

- What are the most urgent housing needs for Bridge Housing participants?
 - Emergency Shelter (non-congregate)
 - Motel-based Sheltering (e.g. 30 days while waiting for other housing)
 - Crisis Housing
 - Transitional Housing
 - Recovery Housing
 - Recuperative Care Models
 - Community Re-Entry and Diversion Housing
 - Rental Assistance (current Bridge Housing funded beds)
 - Auxiliary Funding in Assisted Living Settings (e.g. licensed Adult Residential Facilities)
 - Other licensed transitional housing settings (current Bridge Housing funded beds)





Input

Population focuses (if any)

- Individuals at risk of being in or exiting the criminal justice system
- · Children and youth involved with either the juvenile justice or child welfare system
- Individuals with a primary diagnosis of a substance use disorder (SUD)
- Do not focus on one population, serve all eligible populations as beds and services are available

Other recommendations on program design

- Expand existing Bridge Housing program
- Partner on existing project in the pipeline
- Expand existing programs
- Create new Behavioral Health Bridge Housing beds
