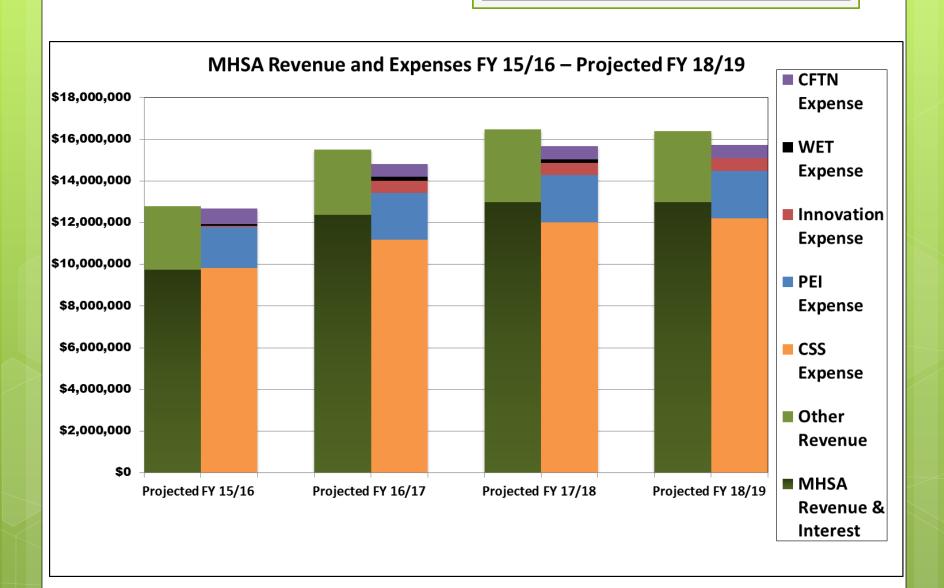

## **Fiscal Report**



#### **Fiscal Report**

- FY 2016-17 Status Quo budget is \$13.9M (MHSA \$11M/Other Revenue \$2.9M)
  - CSS \$10.4M
  - PEI \$2.2M
  - INN \$475K
  - WET \$185K
  - CFTN (Electronic Health Record Support) \$620K
  - Budget Augmentation Requests (to add to Status Quo): CSU and Innovation will increase budget by \$600K (\$14.5M total Budget)
- Prudent Reserve Balance: \$2,813,066
- Current year MHSA allocation for the county increased from .681393% to .686873%

#### **Fiscal Report**

- MHSA Revenue forecast is positive for the next few years; however, the proposed No Place Like Home initiative could potentially reduce future year's available revenue by 7%
- Potential revenue available for new or expanded programs beginning in FY 16/17:
  - CSS: Potential to add \$700K in expenses
  - PEI: Potential to add \$150K in expenses

# Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT)

- Civil court-ordered mental health treatment for certain individuals who have a serious mental disorder
- Intended to serve individuals while living in the community
- Present in 40+ states
  - Degree of implementation varies

## **AOT in California**

- California Welfare and Institutions Code 5345-5349.5
  - Enacted in 2002
  - State law but counties must choose to opt-in
  - No other programs may be eliminated to fund
  - Strict eligibility criteria
  - Extensive menu of service requirements
  - Similar to Full Service Partnerships
  - Civil court proceedings

## **AOT** Criteria

- County resident 18 years or older
- Suffering from a mental illness
- Unlikely to survive safely in the community without supervision
- History or lack of participation in needed mental health treatment
- Person's condition is substantially deteriorating
- Participation in AOT would be least restrictive placementar Luis Obispo County Behavioral Health Dept.

## **AOT Criteria continued**

- In addition, one of the following must be met:
  - 2 psychiatric hospitalizations or incarcerations within the prior 36 months
  - Resulted in violence, or attempts of violence toward self or others within prior 48 months
    - May not include current hospitalization or incarceration

  - Program supervision, and QA would be absorbed by current staff

- Total net cost: \$643K
