

PEI Work Plan Review

- Mental Health Awareness and Stigma Reduction (TMHA & SLOBHD)
- School-based Wellness (CAPSLO, SLOBHD, & The LINK))
- 3. Family Education and Support (Center for Family Strengthening (CFS))
- Early Care and Support for Underserved Populations (Cuesta College & Wilshire CS)
- Integrated Community Wellness (Community Counseling Center, TMHA & SLOBHD)





- The Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) component of MHSA receives 20% of the monthly revenue distribution (less 5% for Innovation)
- PEI funds should be used for programs that prevent mental illness from becoming severe and disabling. Program categories include:
 - Prevention
 - Early Intervention
 - Outreach for Increasing Recognition of Early Signs of Mental Illness
 - Stigma and Discrimination Reduction
 - Suicide Prevention
 - Access and Linkage to Treatment
 - Improve Timely Access to Services for Underserved

- FY 2016-17 Recommended Budget is \$14.3M (MHSA \$11.3M/Other Revenue \$3M)
 - PEI \$2.2M of budget
- Contractors given a 2.2% increase in FY 15-16 and FY 16-17 (based on L.A. C.P.I.)
- Approval of 2016-2017 CalMHSA Contribution
 - **o** \$67,308
 - County contribution to statewide PEI initatives

- MHSA Revenue forecast is positive for the next few years; however, the proposed No Place Like Home bond could potentially reduce future year's available revenue by 7%
- Potential revenue available for new or expanded programs beginning in FY 16/17:
 - CSS: Potential to add \$300K in expenses (less AOT cost)
 - PEI: Potential to add \$150K in expenses
- Governor's May Budget Revise update by next meeting

New Business

- In-Home Parent Educator
 - Currently service is provided for those in foster care, or with open CWS
 - This would open service to all others
 - Family and client-directed, integrated case planning, culturally competent, increasing access
 - 0-18 yr olds
 - More intense service than Parent Coaching (which serves as a referral)
 - South County and SLO for initial model (infrastructure in place)
 - Cost approx. \$75k (Educator and curricula)

New Business

- School-Based Behavioral Health Services
 - Many requests for additional Middle School Student Assistance Programs
 - High school programs not funded in original PEI
 - Requests from schools for Wellness Centers, SAP, etc.
- School partners have asked for more navigation of BH systems, and community resources
- Requesting one-time funds of \$15k to offer FY 16-17 Youth Services Summit/Consultation to assess BH needs amongst secondary schools
- Plan to use additional PEI funds for school services expansion in 17-18
