



Is there an active SWPPP for the residential development AND is the proposed work included in the scope of the SWPPP?

- Project is owned by an individual owner.‡
- Project may include one or more homes or parcels.
- Project disturbs less than 1.0 acre when all disturbance is summed.



Separate SWPPP not required. Project is subject to Local Permit[◇] requirements.

- Project is owned or developed by a single entity.
- Project disturbs more than 1.0 acre when all disturbance is summed. Project may include multiple contiguous lots.
- Project may include multiple non-contiguous lots, located within the same tract*.



Separate SWPPP and Construction General Permit enrollment are required.

Submit an amended SWPPP (and Change of Information) to include the proposed work.

* Tract received approval after 2003.

‡ Example: a custom home on a private lot in an existing residential subdivision.

◇ Local Permit: Grading or building permits that define the scope of the project and require stormwater best management practices for the duration of construction.
