4. Action/Information/Discussion		
4.1 Discussion Item: Working Group Reports	No working group reports were provided.	
4.2 Action Item: Vote to Approve the Revised Alternatives to Encampment Working Group's Recommendations	Laurel and Russ provided background on the Alternatives to Encampment recommendations document. Since this was last reviewed by the Committee, Russ has restructured the document into a report to be presented to City managers and the County Administrative Office (CAO). The Committee discussed the wording of recommendation #4: Catalogue Housing Options and Opportunities, deciding to change the title to 'Create Alternative Housing Options,' and changing the first line from: HSOC recommends that San Luis Obispo County catalogue the various housing options and opportunities that exist throughout the county. to: HSOC recommends that San Luis Obispo County create feasible housing options and opportunities throughout the county and cities, and identify possible sites for the establishment of Tiny House Villages. A further amendment was made to reference support for the Hope's Village project in particular being carried forward (see item 4.4). Laurel clarified that the recommendations will next go to the full HSOC for approval, at its next regular meeting on March 17th, before being sent to the City managers and CAO.	Nicole made a motion to approve the recommendations, with the amendments made by the Committee, seconded by Susan. The motion passed with all in favor, none opposed and no abstentions.

4.3 Discussion Item: Regional	Carolyn presented the Regional Homeless Action Plan. The Plan is intended	
Homeless Action Plan	to bring together the different efforts to address homelessness made by	
Tiomeress Action Flam	the County Administrative Office, City managers, local agencies and the	
	HSOC. The pilot programs being considered as part of the Regional Plan	
	are the safe parking and blue bag programs, beginning in July in priority	
	areas. The blue bag pilot program will move between encampments, due	
	to the expense of running this in multiple locations. County Public Works,	
	who ran a pilot blue bag program in 2019, reported that the largest effort	
	is in the first four weeks.	
	Carolyn clarified that the Community Homeless Action Team referenced in	
	the document is not a CAT (Community Action Team), but is envisioned to	
	consist of two groups – one of which would include staff from law	
	enforcement and homeless service agencies, the other being more policy	
	focused. These policies would come to HSOC for review. Janna suggested	
	that the reporting mechanism back to HSOC should come via the Services	
	Coordinating Committee.	
4.4 Discussion Item: Hope's	Becky provided background on Hope's Village, who are looking for land to	
Village – Sustainable	build a sustainable community village of tiny homes for homeless people	
Community Village	in the county. They are looking to partner with a larger nonprofit. Hope's	
	Village were seeking a general endorsement of the program from the	
	HSOC Encampment Committee to the Board of Supervisors, as the Board	
	has requested this from Hope's Village.	
	The Committee discussed the project and were in favor, noting that the	
	concept of a tiny homes village, and specifically Hope's Village's plans, are	
	referenced in the Alternatives to Encampment recommendations	
	document that will ultimately be sent to the Board of Supervisors, as well	
	as the CAO and City managers. The Committee agreed to include a	
	reference in the document that they support the Hope's Village project in	
	particular being carried forward. This was included in the motion for item	
	4.2.	

4.5 Discussion Item: Current Encampment Issues	Janna reported that one of the camps in South County experienced a major fire.	
4.6 Discussion Item: Winter Warming Centers and Safe Parking	Grace reported that CAPSLO (Community Action Partnership of San Luis Obispo) recently signed a contract with the City of SLO to begin another safe parking program in the railroad section of the city. This program will provide 20 spaces and will not have a case management requirement, though an outreach worker will be available. The spaces are not intended to be permanent for clients, but a temporary place to shelter for 28 days. Screening requirements will include identification, vehicle registration and insurance. Caroline reported that the Los Osos warming shelter continues to operate, although it has not been open for many nights due to the lack of rain. People are also choosing to stay in their vehicles in order to maintain	
	distance from others. Janna reported that the South County warming center has been required to move again, due to the space being used for a vaccination clinic. With the support of the City of Grover Beach, 5CHC (5Cities Homeless Coalition) will be using the Grover Beach Community Center through April 30 th . This has reduced capacity slightly but 5CHC has not had to turn anyone away yet.	
4.7 Discussion Item: Update on COVID-Related Funding Available to Address Unsheltered Homelessness	Laurel shared that the Department of Planning & Building are taking an action item to the Board of Supervisors on March 16 th to approve HSOC's recommendations for the Federal ESG-CV (Emergency Solutions Grant – Coronavirus) Round 2 grant. This will provide funding for emergency shelter activities. The Department of Social Services (DSS) took an item to the Board the previous month for the State ESG-CV grant, which will provide funding for rapid rehousing and street outreach. DSS are now waiting for the State to send the contract, after which DSS will enter into agreements with subrecipients.	
	The State will begin operating the ERAP (Emergency Rental Assistance	

	Program) in SLO County on March 15th. More information will be available on how people at risk of losing their housing can contact the State to benefit from this program.
