1. Determination of a Quorum and Introductions

A quorum of 14 is established.

2. Approval of May 1, 2019 Meeting Minutes

Member E. Greening states that he would like to add the word "draft" to the environmental impact report section of the previous meeting minutes.

A motion by Member E. Greening which is seconded by Member C. Mulholland to approve the meeting minutes with the discussed change. (12-0-5)

3. Ongoing Updates:

- a. <u>Rain and Reservoir Report</u> There are no comments
- b. <u>Groundwater Basin Management Efforts</u> There are no comments
- c. <u>Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM)</u> There are no comments
- d. <u>Stormwater Resource Plan</u> There are no comments
- e. Various County Water Programs, Policies, and Ordinances

Member E. Greening states that the Council of Governments approved a bill requiring housing plans to include the numbers into their general plan. Water planning is not included in this plan.

Member C. Mulholland states that programs offering rewards for using drought resistant yard should be checked to verify what exactly is being offered.

f. Open Reporting on Water Conservation Opportunities and Information

Member E. Greening states that there is a public comment opportunity to discuss the lease of oil drilling sites in Monterey County.

4. IRWM Proposition 1, Round 1 Grant Project Selection Update, and Consider Support

County Staff B. Clark begins the presentation by providing some information about the selection update. He states that he will touch on the priorities of DWR and what the local process is as well as the projects in this grant. The elements of this presentation are as follows:

- City of San Luis Obispo presented their One Water Project. A membrane bi-reactor with a UV disinfection method would increase water quality and quantity.
- Nipomo Community Services District presented their Nipomo Area Pipeline Improvement Project. This project integrates 5 water systems.
- The Community of Los Osos presented their 8th street well project.
- The Oceano Community Services District presented their Water Resource Reliability Project
- The San Simeon Community Services District presented their reservoir expansion project.

After the presenting agencies are heard, County Staff B. Clark gives insight to the funding of the previously mentioned projects.

A motion by Member A. Pease which is seconded by Member S. Sinton is made to recommend the list of selected projects to the Board of Supervisors. (13-0-1)

5. <u>Updates from Resource Conservation Districts and Community Services Districts on Water Issues</u> <u>Relevant to Their Group or Agency</u>

Coastal RCD Representative L. Chipping states that the RCDs within San Luis Obispo County will focus on soil and water. Representative L. Chipping provides information about projects that the RCD will be taking on. One of the projects includes a restoration contract with the State of California Parks and Recreation. Another project includes a soil monitoring project.

Upper Salinas defers to September.

Los Osos Community Services District Representative C. Cesena goes over the low number of nitrates in the 8th street well project that was previously discussed. C. Cesena also goes over information about other new well installations that are replacing older wells.

Nipomo Community Services District Representative M. Iglesias gives more information about the previously mentioned pipeline improvement project. He states that Nipomo is ready to take the next step into this project. M. Iglesias also provides reasoning to the 960 AF limit of the pipeline as well as Nipomo CSD's relationship with the water systems stemming from Santa Maria.

Oceano Community Services District Representative C. Replogle states that the CSD has formed a water agenda.

Templeton Community Services District Representative G. English states that the Upper Salinas Conjunctive Use Project to capture flows from Paso and send the captured water to Templeton's treatment plants is 93% complete. This project is looking to be completed sometime in June.

6. Discuss WRAC By-Laws and Consider Actions

County Staff R. Dienzo goes over the previous objections of the WRAC By-Laws and how they have been changed to meet the committee's standards.

A motion is made by Member E. Greening which is seconded by Member C. Mulholland to pass the discussed By-laws with grammar amendments is passed by unanimous voice vote.

7. Discuss Future Agenda Items

The next meeting will take place in September. The Water Quality Control Board will attend the next meeting as well as the Water Resources Control Board to provide information about climate change's impact on water.

Member E. Greening suggests if the Board of Supervisors acts on the Fractured Rock issue that it be reported.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS MEETINGS AND BASIN UPDATES:

Basin	Update:
Los Osos	The Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) requires DWR to reassess groundwater basin prioritization any time it updates Bulletin 118 basin boundaries. On April 30, 2019, DWR published the Draft SGMA 2019 Basin Prioritizations based on the 2019 Basin Boundary Modifications. Below are DWR's draft prioritizations for Los Osos Basin.
Basin Fringe Area	• <u>Los Osos Area Subbasin (</u> adjudicated area) is listed as very low priority for SGMA ¹ and in critical conditions of overdraft ² . Under SGMA, the court approved adjudicated area is exempt from the requirements of SGMA.
	• <u>Warden Creek Subbasin</u> is listed at very low priority for SGMA ¹ For more information on DWR's basin prioritization process, please visit: <u>https://water.ca.gov/Programs/Groundwater-Management/Basin-Prioritization</u>
Atascadero Basin	 The Atascadero Basin was re-prioritized to a "very low" priority basin by the DWR in 2018 and is, therefore, not subject to SGMA requirements. The Executive Committee of the Atascadero Basin GSA has approved continuing with preparation of a GSP by January 31, 2022 in order to remain eligible for the Atascadero Basin's awarded GSP Development Grant Funds. Santa Maria Basin	 April 30, 2019 – The State Department of Water Resources (DWR) released the Draft SGMA 2019 Prioritization (Phase 2). Below are DWR's draft prioritizations for Santa Maria Basin.

¹ As noted by DWR, the priority for the subbasin has been set to very low (0 total priority points) as a result of conditions being met under the sub-component C of the Draft SGMA 2019 Basin Prioritizations.

² Critical conditions of overdraft have been identified in 21 groundwater basins as described in Bulletin 118 (Water Code Section 12924). Bulletin 118 (updates 2003) defines a groundwater basin subject to condition of critical overdraft as: "A basin is subject to critical conditions of overdraft when continuation of present water management practices would probably result in significant adverse overdraft-related environmental, social, or economic impacts."

Fringe Area	 Santa Maria subbasin – very low priority. This subbasin consists of an adjudicated area and other non-adjudicated fringe areas. However, only the priority of the non-adjudicated fringe areas was assessed, which include the Ziegler Canyon Fringe Area in San Luis Obispo County and other fringe areas in Santa Barbara County. Arroyo Grande subbasin – very low priority. c) Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM)

d) Stormwater Resource Plan

California Senate Bill No. 985 requires the development of a stormwater resource plan (SWRP) for public agencies to receive grant funds for stormwater and dry weather runoff capture projects.

The City of Arroyo Grande and the County of San Luis Obispo collaborated on the development of a region-wide SWRP. The SWRP must be compliant with the State Water Board's SWRP Guidelines

adopted December 15, 2015 and the California Water Code Section 10561-10573. The work completed by the City of Arroyo Grande with Grant Agreement D1612607 is being combined with Task 12 of the County's Department of Water Resources IRWM Planning Grant (Agreement No. 4600011892).

The goals of the County of San Luis Obispo SWRP are to identify and prioritize stormwater and dry weather runoff capture projects in the county through detailed analyses of watershed conditions and processes, surface and groundwater resources, and the multiple benefits that can be achieved through stormwater-related capital projects and other programmatic actions.

Project Updates

- The Final SWRP is currently being reviewed by the State Water Resources Control Board. Concurrence is expected in October 2019.
- The Final SWRP report and appendices are available for viewing on the County's website: www.slocounty.ca.gov/pw/swrp
- Solicitation for Proposition 1- Implementation Round 2 grant funding is expected to open in late 2019. Approximately \$90 million is available statewide.

e) Various County Water Programs, Policies, and Ordinances

Amending the Water Neutral New Development Ordinances for the Paso Robles Groundwater Basin

On June 18, 2019, the Board directed staff to consider amendments to Title 19 and Title 22 to extend the 1:1 water offset requirement for new construction and for new and expanded irrigated crop production overlying the Paso Robles Groundwater Basin. This offset requirement is currently set to expire with the adoption of the Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP). The proposed amendments extend the expiration date for five years until January 2025 to allow time for the new management actions established by the GSP to be implemented, so there is not a "gap". The proposed amendments also modify the Agriculture Offset Ordinance to 1) eliminate the option of transferring water credits off-site, 2) include a water duty factor for hemp, 3) include a process for issuing water duty factors for unlisted crops, and 4) include a method for determining historic on-site water use. The tentative timeline is a hearing with Planning Commission on September 12 and with the Board on November 5. Paso Robles Groundwater Basin (PRGWB) and the Nipomo Mesa Water Conservation Area (NMWCA) – The County is continuing to process building permits that are subject to the fees of the PRGWB and the NMWCA. The Cash for Grass program offers \$1 per square foot up to a maximum rebate amount of \$6,000 per household. The Washer Rebate Program offers \$250 per household when replacing an old washer with a new water efficient washer (replacement must save at least 15 gallons). The Plumbing Retrofit Program offers homeowners the opportunity to replace old fixtures with new water efficient fixtures in their homes (limited to 2 toilets, 2 showerheads, and 2 faucet aerators) at no cost from the homeowner.

Los Osos – The retrofit to build program within the community of Los Osos is allowing property owners to retrofit washers within and outside the prohibition zone to acquire retrofit credits. At this time, to earn enough credits to build one single family residence (300 credits), a property owner would need to replace 6-8 washers; a total cost ranging between \$4,000-\$6,000.

f) Open Reporting on Water Conservation Opportunities & Information

WRAC members or members of the public may openly report on any topic related to water conservation including opportunities to be a part of a water conservation focus group, reporting back on water conservation groups that they are a part of, or providing information on water conservation items.

g) Update on Hydrologic Study of the Adelaida Area

On August 13, 2019, the Board of Supervisors provided direction to staff to contract with the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) to conduct a hydrogeologic study of the Adelaida area, west of the City of Paso Robles. The study involves the investigation of the existing conditions of the underlying fractured bedrock to help understand the specific issues related to groundwater resources of this area. It is anticipated that the proposed study would provide a factual basis for development and support of potential future groundwater management actions in the Adelaida area.

Based on the Board's direction, staff is currently working with USGS to refine their proposal to only proceed with the initial tasks to compile and review existing hydrologic and geologic data, develop and update a project specific website, and interim deliverables and outreach efforts necessary to present findings and recommendations. These initial tasks are anticipated to take about a year to complete. Staff will return to the Board afterwards to present the preliminary results and recommendations on continuing with the subsequent tasks. These following efforts may include collecting new data, integrating and analyzing the hydrogeologic system, and developing a USGS Scientific Investigations Report.

- Watershed Wise Landscape Training

The presentation will discuss an overview of these two landscape water use efficiency programs coordinated by the Santa Barbara County Water Agency (SBCWA) through the Regional Water Efficiency Program (RWEP) and its partner agencies.

The Green Gardener program has a 20-year history of training landscape maintenance professionals to be more knowledgeable about sustainable and Water Wise landscape practices, and to implement them throughout Santa Barbara County. This program has evolved into a certificate class through both Santa Barbara City College and Allan Hancock College. The Watershed Wise Landscape Training offerings were provided to both homeowners in a short workshop format, and to landscape professionals as a multi-day nationally recognized certification through EPA WaterSense.

Discussion

During the WRAC meeting February 6, 2019, the Water Conservation Subcommittee presented recommendations on additional water conservation measures that can be recommended to the Board of Supervisors. The cover letter and list of recommendations were approved by the WRAC and were sent to the Board of Supervisors on February 26, 2019.

One of list of recommendations called for the WRAC and ALAB to meet and "identify improved ag water efficiency measures." Measures relating to projects/programs that integrate flood management, water quality and groundwater recharge requires collaboration with other advisory boards with more expertise in these areas. The subcommittee concluded that the agricultural community would be a good starting point to discuss these ideas. Forming a subcommittee to collaborate with the ALAB would help form ideas for water conservation that go beyond measures limited to urban use.
