4. Presentation on Fox Canyon Groundwater Management Agency Advanced Metering
Infrastructure and Water Market Programs, by Arne Anselm, Deputy Director of Ventura
County Watershed Protection District

Guest Arne Anselm introduces Ventura's water sources, the importance of groundwater, management of groundwater, actions taken by the Fox Canyon Groundwater Management Agency, and the advanced metering infrastructure to support water markets.

Guest Arne Anselm states that two-thirds of Ventura's water is groundwater and groundwater supply 85% of agriculture. Fox Canyon Groundwater Management Agency was formed in 1983 to stop sea water intrusion. A third-party exchange administrator is used to handle, trading of water allocations between parties, and Advanced Metering Infrastructure to protect trade secrets. An ordinance was adopted to require all active agricultural wells with a meter to have the same AMI.

Member L. Chipping reports on the outreach at the Agricultural Liaison Advisory Board (ALAB) with discussions on conservation measures. Member L. The public comment period for the BBMR application closed on October 26, 2018. DWR is expected to release the Draft Los Osos Basin Boundary Modification Request (BBMR) results in late November / December 2018.

c) Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM)

The Department of Water Resources released the draft proposal solicitation package (PSP) for the Prop 1, Round 1 IRWM Grant in October. They are accepting comments on the draft until Nov. 20th.

d) Stormwater Resource Plan

California Senate Bill No. 985 requires the development of a stormwater resource plan for public agencies to receive grant funds for stormwater and dry weather runoff capture projects.

Currently, the City of Arroyo Grande and the County of San Luis Obispo are collaborating to develop a region-wide SWRP. The SWRP must be compliant with the State Water Board's SWRP Guidelines adopted December 15, 2015 and the California Water Code Section 10561-10573. The work completed by the City of Arroyo Grande with Grant Agreement D1612607 is being combined with Task 12 of the County's Department of Water Resources IRWM Planning Grant (Agreement No. 4600011892).

The goals of the County of San Luis Obispo SWRP are to identify and prioritize stormwater and dry weather runoff capture projects in the county through detailed analyses of watershed conditions and processes, surface and groundwater resources, and the multiple benefits that can be achieved through stormwater-related capital projects and other programmatic actions.

The SWRP Project Management Team (PMT) is comprised of County Public Works staff, Coastal San Luis and Upper Salinas Las Tablas RCD staff, and staff from the City of Arroyo Grande. The PMT receives feedback and assistance from a Technical Advisory Committee (TAC). The PMT meets monthly to receive updates on deliverables from the Consultant Team and to discuss next steps.

The PMT has compiled a Project List through the solicitation of projects from stakeholders, TAC Leads, and other interested organizations and agencies. Stakeholder and public outreach meetings have been used to disseminate information and to solicit both proposed projects as well as suggested approaches to project prioritization.

Project Updates

- The 30-day public comment period for the DRAFT report closed on October 10, 2018.
- The TAC will have a final chance to review and comment on the DRAFT report from November 15-20, 2018.
- The FINAL report will be submitted to the State Board on November 30, 2018.
- Upon concurrence with the State Board, the SWRP will be submitted to IRWM's Regional Water Management Group (RWMG) for eventual integration into the IRWMP. The implementation of the SWRP will be overseen by County Staff.

e) Various County Water Programs, Policies, and Ordinances

1. COUNTYWIDE WATER CONSERVATION PROGRAM

http://www.slocountywwcp.org

Following approval by the Board of Supervisors on July 11, 2017 to amend the Turf Removal Incentive Program ("cash for grass") and the Plumbing Retrofit Program of the adopted Countywide Water Conservation Program (Resolution 2016-288) staff revealed the new Water Conservation Program website (url and link above). The website is an improvement on the old Paso Basin website as it provides a much more user-friendly, geographically based, navigation approach. Users simply select the geographic area they reside (Paso, Nipomo, Los Osos), and choose which program they are interested in learning more about (Ag offset, plumbing retrofit, cash for grass). For any questions or if anyone has any comments or suggestions on the new website, please email Kylie Hensley at khensley@co.slo.ca.us.

- a. **Paso Robles Groundwater Basin** The County is continuing to process building permits that are subject to the fees of the PRGWB. The Cash for Grass program offers \$1 per square foot up to a maximum rebate amount of \$6,000 per household. The Washer Rebate Program offers \$250 per household when replacing an old washer with a new water efficient washer (replacement must save at least 15 gallons). The Plumbing Retrofit Program offers homeowners the opportunity to replace old fixtures with new water efficient fixtures in their homes (limited to 2 toilets, 2 showerheads, and 2 faucet aerators) at no cost from the homeowner.
- b. **Nipomo Mesa Water Conservation Area** The County is continuing to process building permits subject to the fees of the NMWCA. The Cash for Grass program offers \$1 per square foot up to a maximum rebate amount of \$6,000 per household.

The Washer Rebate Program offers \$250 per household when replacing an old washer with a new water efficient washer (replacement must save at least 15 gallons). The Plumbing Retrofit Program offers homeowners the opportunity to replace old fixtures with new water efficient fixtures in their homes (limited to 2 toilets, 2 showerheads, and 2 faucet aerators) at no cost from the homeowner.

c. **Los Osos** – The retrofit to build and retrofit on sale program within the community of Los Osos is allowing property owners to retrofit washers within and outside the prohibition zone to acquire retrofit credits. At this time, to earn enough credits to build one single family residence (300 credits), a property owner would need to replace 6-8 washers; a total cost ranging between \$4,000-\$6,000.

f) Open Reporting on Water Conservation Opportunities & Information

WRAC members or members of the public may openly report on any topic related to water conservation including opportunities to be a part of a water conservation focus group, reporting back on water conservation groups that they are a part of, or providing information on water conservation items.

g) Schedule for 2019

See the attached WRAC Schedule for 2019. No meetings are scheduled for January, July, and August. The meeting locations for February, March, and May are not solidified at the time this agenda was generated. But updates will be provided as soon as possible.



Recommendation

Consider forwarding the compiled subcommittee and committee comments on the review of the Water Section of the Biennial Resource Summary Report for the County Resource Management System to the County Planning and Building Department.

Discussion

At the September 5, 2018 WRAC meeting, WRAC members approved formation of an ad hoc subcommittee tasked with reviewing the water section of the 2016-2018 Draft Biennial Resource Summary Report for the County Resource Management System. Subcommittee members included: Greg Grewal, Jim Garing, Tim Walters, and Bill Garfinkel. Bill Garfinkel dropped out of the subcommittee due to personal scheduling conflicts.

The subcommittee met to review the draft Biennial Report on November 27th to consider comments received from the subcommittee members. Planning staff, Ben Schuster and Brian Pedrotti, were also present. Subcommittee members Jim Garing and Tim Walters submitted some written comments (see attachments). Greg Grewal will present his comments verbally at the meeting.

These comments along with the verbal comments made at this December 5th WRAC meeting will be compiled; actions will be considered.

RSR Review Subcommittee Member Jim Garing's comments:

My comments focus on the Water Supply sections of the draft report dealing with the NCMA and NMMA segments of the Santa Maria River Valley groundwater Basin:

At our meeting of November 27, I raised a number of other issues:

- 1- The following wording from NMMA's 2017 Annual Report is typical of that found in the executive summary of all NMMA Annual Reports:
- "5. There are a number of direct measurements that indicate that demand exceeds the ability of the supply to replace the water pumped from the aquifers (see Section 7.1.2 Hydrologic Inventory)."

From the above including the NCMA TG comments on the 2014-16 RSR draft, a reasonable person would conclude that the NMMA is in serious overdraft.

2- Groundwater modeling by Geoscience for the NCMA and NMMA areas is in an advanced stage where model runs for various test scenarios are currently being run by Geoscience with guidance from the NCMA and NMMA technical groups. As part of initial examinations, groundwater in storage under NMMA has been modeled as illustrated on the diagram I handed out at our November 27 meeting.

As I explained to the Subcommittee at that meeting, it is striking that groundwater in storage under NMMA, beginning the year that the Santa Maria groundwater lawsuit was settled (2005) through 2015, groundwater in storage under NMMA fell approximately 21,000 acre feet and from 2002 to 2016 fell approximately 35,000 acre feet. This is even more striking when viewed with the backdrop of rainfall cumulative departure from the mean which, for the period of approximately 1995 to 2015 was well above the mean.

NMMA's Annual Report for 2017 also indicates in the executive summary:

- "7. The period of analysis (1975-2017) used by the TG is roughly 7 percent "wetter" on average than the long-term record (1920-2017) indicating there is a slight bias toward overstating the amount of local water supply resulting from percolation of rainfall (see Section 7.3.1 Climatological Trends)."
- 3- The above is important to NCMA because in my view, ever lowering inland groundwater levels within NMMA expose NCMA to seawater intrusion because NCMA wells are much closer the ocean than NMMA wells are. To illustrate this risk, I have attached page 56 from NMMA's 2017 Annual Report showing NMMA Fall 2017 groundwater contours and a large area at elevation "0" extending into NCMA.

In summary, there is adequate reason to believe that the NMMA is in serious overdraft. I understand that NMMA is already listed at Level of severity III. If the RSR update and staff report can recommend ways to assist NCSD in funding the Nipomo Supplemental Water project, that would be of assistance to NCMA since every gallon that NMMA does not have to pump will reduce that overdraft.
