ASSISTANCE FOR VOTERS WITH DISABILITIES







San Luis Obispo now offers voters with disabilities two options that provide a private and independent voting environment.

VOTING BY MAIL: Every voter is eligible to apply for a permanent or regular vote by mail ballot. This allows a voter to receive their ballot 29 days prior to an election and to vote and return the ballot to the County Clerk's Office or any polling location in San Luis Obispo County by election day.

AUTOMARK TERMINAL: San Luis Obispo County is proud to introduce the AutoMARK ballot marking device to assist our voters with marking their ballot. The device will be available in every polling place on election day and at the County Clerk-Recorder's Office 29 days prior to the election for early voting.

The AutoMARK is simple to use The voter inserts the ballot and makes their selections using:

Touchscreen

or

Headphones with one of the following:

- √ Braille Keypad
- √ Sip & Puff Device (a personal ADA device)
- √ Foot Pedal (a personal ADA device)

The AutoMARK marks the voter's selections on the ballot.

HELPFUL HINTS MAKE ELECTION DAY EASIER!

Your precinct workers are citizens like you. They sincerely want to make voting easy while protecting against voter fraud. Here are some ideas for you to make Election day easier for all.

- Your polling place is listed on the back page of this Sample Ballot booklet.
- If you are not planning to vote by mail, check to make sure you know where your polling place is located. If you are not sure how to find your polling place, check a map or call 781-5228 before Election day, if possible.
- Take the back page of this Sample Ballot booklet with you to the polls to help your precinct workers quickly locate your name and address on the voter roster.
- Go to the polls prepared. Read and mark your sample ballot prior to Election day and take it with you to refer to while you are in the voting booth. This is especially helpful with a lengthy ballot.
- If you are a first time voter, be prepared to show identification, see below

NEW REQUIREMENTS FOR FIRST TIME VOTERS

The Help America Vote Act requires first time voters to show identification when voting. If you registered or re-registered to vote by mail after January 1, 2006, did not provide either a California driver's license or identification card number or the last four digits of your Social Security number, and have not previously voted in San Luis Obispo County you will be required to show your current valid photo I.D. or a copy of one of the following that shows your name and address when you go to the polls on election day: Current Utility Bill, Bank Statement, Government Check, Government Paycheck or a Government Document. The same requirement applies if you request to vote by mail. You will be required to send a copy of one of the above with your voted ballot. If you have questions about your status as a First Time Voter, contact the Elections Division at 805 781-5228.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS MEASURE A-10

Measure A-10 was unanimously placed on the ballot by the Arroyo Grande City Council to ask voters to approve issuing and selling general obligation bonds in an amount up to \$6,000,000 to construct a new Police Station facility. California law authorizes cities to issue general obligation bonds to finance "municipal improvements", including the construction of police stations. The proposed new 30 year bond issue includes an amount sufficient to retire the bonds that were issued in 2003 to construct the Fire Station.

The proposed funding includes repaying the bonds partly through a real property tax at a tax assessment rate equal to or below the existing tax rate for the Fire Station bonds, and also using funds from the 2006 Local Sales Tax Measure to pay the balance of the bond payment. Funding is also based upon purchase of the bonds by the U.S. Department of Agriculture through a low-interest community facility financing program, for which a preliminary application has been approved.

The real property tax would be assessed on the value of commercial, residential, industrial, agricultural and utility property within the City. According to the tax rate statement provided by the City's financial consultant, the best estimate of highest annual tax rate to property owners is \$8.20 for each \$100,000 of assessed value, which is the current tax rate for the Fire Station bonds.

The existing police station was acquired in 1973 and was last expanded in 1989. Since 1973, staffing has grown from 12 full-time and 6 part-time employees to 36 full-time and 20 part-time employees in 2010. The proposed new Police Station will meet the following needs that have been identified by City staff: an emergency operations center, expansion of the dispatch center, expansion of evidence and equipment storage and additional parking for police vehicles and staff. The City has entered into an agreement with the County of San Luis Obispo to acquire property for the proposed new Police Station at no cost.

A "yes" vote is a vote in favor of authorizing the City of Arroyo Grande to issue general obligation bonds not to exceed the principal amount of \$6,000,000 to retire the 2003 Fire Station bonds and construct a new Police Station.

A "no" vote is a vote to not authorize the issuance and sale of said bonds.

The Measure will pass if two-thirds of those voting on the measure vote "yes".

TAX RATE STATEMENT MEASURE A-10

An election will be held in the City of Arroyo Grande (the "City") on June 8, 2010, to authorize the sale of up to \$6,000,000 in bonds by the City to finance construction of a new Police Station and refinance the 2003 Fire Station bonds as described in the proposition. If the bonds are approved, the City expects to sell the bonds in single series in calendar year 2010. Principal of and interest on the bonds will be payable in part from the proceeds of tax levies made upon the taxable property in the City. The following information is provided in compliance with Sections 9400-9405 of the Elections Code of the State of California.

- 1. The best estimate of the tax which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue during the first fiscal year after the sale of the bonds, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is .00820 cents per \$100 assessed valuation (\$8.20 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation) in fiscal year 2011-12.
- 2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is .00820 cents per \$100 assessed valuation (\$8.20 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation) in fiscal year 2011-12.

Voters should note that it is the intention of the City to pay a portion of annual bond payments with revenues from the 2006 Local Sales Tax Measure so as to maintain the tax rate at or below the existing tax rate for the Fire Station Bonds, which is currently .00820 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

Voters should note that the estimated tax rates are based on the *assessed value* of taxable property on the official tax roles of the city, <u>not</u> on the property's market value. In addition, taxpayers eligible for a property tax exemption, such as the homeowner's exemption, will be taxed at a lower effective tax rate than described above. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills and tax advisors to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

Attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based on the City's current projections and estimates only. The actual tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary from those presently estimated, due to variations from these estimates in the timing of the bond sale, the amount of bonds sold, interest rates at the time of bond sale, and actual assessed valuations over the term of repayment of the bonds. The date of sale and the amount of bonds sold will be determined by the City based on need for construction funds and other factors. The actual interest rate at which the bonds will be sold, not to exceed 5% per annum, will depend on the bond market at the time of sale. Actual future assessed valuations will depend upon the amount of taxable property within the City as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE A-10

Your "YES" vote on Measure A-10 will provide funding to construct a much needed new Police Station at West Branch Street and Rodeo Drive. The project and financing have been designed to ensure it is completed in the most cost effective way possible <u>without</u> raising your annual tax rates.

The Arroyo Grande Police Department has a distinguished history of keeping our community safe by providing outstanding public safety services. However, important facilities are needed to continue to accomplish this.

The Police Department has grown to meet the community's needs since the existing building began housing the City's police force in 1973. As a result, it no longer has adequate space to perform necessary functions. Upgrade and expansion of the emergency operations center, 9-1-1, emergency communications, detective offices, evidence and equipment storage, and parking are needed.

An independent study determined construction of a new station is the most cost effective option to address these needs. It is important to construct the project at this time to take advantage of current low construction costs. To further minimize costs, property was acquired at no additional expense to the City through an innovative agreement with the County, and the existing station will be sold to generate a portion of the revenue needed.

The remainder of funding will be generated by issuing bonds. In order to repay the bonds without raising property tax rates, bonds issued in 2003 to expand the Fire Station will be refinanced for a 30 year term. The balance of debt costs will be paid from local sales tax proceeds from the 2006 ballot measure.

Arroyo Grande citizens depend on the Police Department for protection. Now officers are depending on you to provide them the facilities needed to do their job. Your City Council strongly urges you to vote "YES" on Measure A-10.
