WHAT'S NEW IN 2012?

HOW DID THE TOP TWO OPEN PRIMARY ACT AFFECT THE GENERAL ELECTION?

For all voter nominated offices (U.S. Senate, U.S. Congress, State Senate and State Assembly) only the two candidates who received the highest and second highest number of votes in the Primary Election will be on the ballot for the General Election.

In addition, write-in candidates are not allowed for these contests so there are no write-in lines presented to the voters.

SAMPLE BALLOT OPT OUT

New legislation allows voters to "Opt Out" of receiving a sample ballot, voter pamphlet (information guide), notice of polling place, and associated materials by mail, and instead obtain them electronically on the County's Website. For every voter that "opts out", the county will save between 50 and 70 cents on printing and mailing costs. About 6 weeks prior to Election Day, the Clerk-Recorder will directly email voters, as well as post announcements on the Clerk-Recorder's Twitter and Facebook accounts, that this information is available online and the voter can access the information at their convenience.

CHANGES TO REDUCE COUNTY COSTS

Digest Sized Books- Due to recent changes which increased postage to send full-sized booklets, the sample ballot booklet was reformatted to a "digest-sized" booklet (5.5" x 8.5"). By reformatting this booklet, the county will be sending the voter information guide at the most efficient postage rates. Because of this change in the size of the booklet, the contests on the ballot are laid out over a series of pages. The contests are in the same order as on the ballot but the voter does not have an exact replica of the 14 inch ballot used for this election. The full ballot image is available via the polling place lookup on www.slovote.com.

Sample Ballot Booklet only sent to Non Permanent Vote By Mail Voters- The County Sample Ballot Booklet and Voter Information Guide is required to be sent to all voters and is typically mailed on E-40 (September 27). To help save costs associated with an additional mailing; this booklet and the vote-by-mail ballot are included in one envelope for the nearly 90,000 voters who are registered as Permanent Vote-by-mail voters or who reside in a Mail Ballot Precinct. The all inclusive mailing to these voters will hit the post offices on October 9.

NEW POLLING PLACES- VOTERS NEED TO CHECK POLLING PLACE LOCATION BEFORE HEADING OUT ON ELECTION DAY

In San Luis Obispo County, we rely on public buildings for polling places. Using these buildings gives more stability to the polling place locations and does not leave the voters and precinct workers susceptible to poor weather and changes to locations because of vacations or illnesses. However the demand for these buildings is great and although our local agencies, schools and churches are also cooperative in ensuring we have sufficient space for Election Day activities, some polling places may change from previous locations due to scheduling conflicts. For instance, we will not be using the Mid State Fairgrounds as a polling place in the 2012 elections. In past elections over 5000 voters have been assigned to this site alone. As always, it is important that voters check to make sure they know the polling place to which they are assigned, either by looking on their sample ballot or using our on-line polling place search- see page 5.

WEBSITE CHANGES AND NEW FEATURES

NEW URL- The election information can now be accessed using www.slovote.com. This will link directly to the election page of the County Clerk-Recorder website.

NEW ON-LINE VOTER REGISTRATION

Thanks to a collaborative effort between county registrars, the Secretary of State and Department of Motor Vehicles, voters can now register to vote on-line. The voter enters their information in the secure system and, if a match is found with the DMV database, the voter's information and signature will be forwarded to the appropriate county elections office. If there is no match found, the voter will be prompted to print the registration form, sign it and return it to their local elections office. This new system makes voter registration convenient and accessible to voters, especially as registration deadlines approach. In addition, because the data from any voter who registers on-line populates the county's database, it reduces the manual data entry associated with the forms and will reduce the inherent errors caused by illegible information and computer entry mistakes. NEW LOOKUP FOR VOTER REGISTRATION STATUS, WHAT ARE MY DISTRICTS? AND VOTE-BY-MAIL BALLOT STATUS

Using the Voter Status Search webpage, voters can verify they are registered to vote at their current address, obtain a listing of the districts in which their residence is located and track their vote-by-mail status.



To see your voter status, enter the following information and click "Show status".

Find Polling Place

To access the information, the voter is required to enter their birth date, last 4 digits of their CA driver's license and the numbers of their street address. If an exact match is found, their registration status will be confirmed, their vote-by-mail ballot status information for the current election and the districts in which they reside will be displayed. To maintain voter confidentiality, the system will not display the voter's name or address but will merely confirm their registration status. The system will be updated daily with both registration and vote-by-mail status information. If the voter is unable to find the information on the web, they can continue to contact our office by phone at 781-5228 or by email at elections@co.slo.ca.us.

INSUFFICIENT CANDIDATES

School and Special Districts

The Elections Code provides that if, for any contest, the number of candidates who have filed papers is less than or equal to the number of positions available, the candidates will not be placed on the ballot and will be appointed in lieu of election. Any candidate so appointed shall serve as though he or she was elected. If no candidate(s) filed for a position, the school district shall make an appointment for all school district seats and the Board of Supervisors shall make appointments for all Community Services and Special District seats. These appointments are brought to the Board before election day.

The following school districts had insufficient candidates and will not be on the ballot:

Cities

The Elections Code provides that if, for all contests the number of candidates who have filed papers is less than or equal to the number of positions available, the city can pass a resolution cancelling the election and appointing the candidates who filed nomination papers in lieu of election. The City of Arroyo Grande has adopted such a resolution and there will be no city contests on the ballot.

PLACEMENT ON THE BALLOT/ROTATION OF CANDIDATES

The order in which candidates' names appear on the ballot is determined by a random drawing of the 26 letters of the alphabet. This random drawing is conducted by the Secretary of State and the County Clerk-Recorder prior to each election. The random drawing for this election was held on August 16, 2012.

Election law also requires the names of candidates for some offices to change positions, such as federal, statewide and county wide offices (i.e. Governor, United States Senator, Secretary of State, United States Representative). The purpose of the rotation is so one candidate's name does not always appear first, or last, on all of the ballots for the races.

As required by state law, names of candidates for certain offices are rotated on the ballot as follows:

OFFICE	ROTATION
Statewide Offices, United States Representative, Board of Equalization member	Candidates' names are arranged in accordance with the alphabetical drawing beginning with the lowest numbered Assembly District in the State or Congressional or Board of Equalization District. Thereafter, for each succeeding Assembly District, the candidate's name appearing first is placed last; the order of the other names remains unchanged. Since San Luis Obispo County is represented by only one Assembly District, these candidates will be in the same order on every ballot in this county.

State Senate and State Assembly	For multi-county districts, such as the senate and assembly each county conducts a random drawing and the candidates' names are arranged in accordance with each county's alphabetical drawing- no other rotation.
Cities, Schools, Community Services and Special Districts	No rotation

VOTE-BY-MAIL BALLOT INFORMATION

History: Absentee ballots were first made available by the North for the soldiers and sailors in the Civil War. California first allowed absentee voting in 1920 for those who were ill or disabled, lived too far from the polls and other special circumstances. In 1978 legislation was passed which allowed universal absentee voting. As a result of this change, allowing any person to vote absentee (now vote-by-mail), it has become a very popular means to cast a ballot. See the chart on page 16 to track the trend of voters casting their ballots by mail. In 2002, permanent absentee voting was expanded to any voter upon request. There are currently over 80,000 permanent vote-by-mail voters in San Luis Obispo County totaling more than 53.4% of the total registered voters.

How to Apply for a Vote-by-Mail Ballot:

The first day this office can issue a vote-by-mail ballot for the General Election is October 9, 2012 (29 days before the election). Vote-by-mail ballot requests must be received no later than October 30th (7 days before the election) in order for the ballot to be mailed to the voter. After that date, the voter must appear in the Office of the County Clerk-Recorder and complete an application indicating the reason they cannot appear at the polls on Election Day. Vote-by-mail ballots may be requested in one of four ways:

- By filling out and mailing the Vote by Mail Application on the back cover of the sample ballot booklet. Sample ballot booklets will be mailed September 27.
- By letter to the County Clerk-Recorder, 1055 Monterey St., D120 San Luis Obispo CA 93408. The letter must state the voter's name, residence address, address to which the ballot should be sent and voter's signature.
- In person at the County Clerk-Recorder's Office- in San Luis Obispo at the address above or for voters living in the North County, at our office in Atascadero- 5955 Capistrano Ave., Suite B. The office hours in Atascadero are 7:30-4:00.
- By faxing a written request to the County Clerk-Recorder's Office at 781-1111.
- By emailing a request to elections@co.slo.ca.us.

Vote-by-mail ballots cannot be requested over the telephone as a written request from the voter is required.

To be counted, the voted ballot must be mailed in time to be received by the County Clerk-Recorder's office by 8:00 p.m. on November 6, 2012 or returned by the voter personally to any polling place in the county no later than 8:00 p.m. on Election Day. Due to proposed changes in delivery of U.S. mail, it is recommended that voters do not mail ballots after the Wednesday prior to the election to ensure that the ballot will be received in time to be counted. The voter may also authorize a designated family member or a person living in the voter's household to return the voted ballot to any polling place in the county or to the County Clerk-Recorder's Office.

WEEKEND VOTING

For the convenience of our voters that discover they will not be able to go to the polls on Election Day, the County Clerk-Recorder's Office will be open on the Saturday and Sunday before the election from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. to issue vote-by-mail ballots. Voters may vote the ballot in the office at the voting booths or have a designated person return the ballot for them by 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.

PREPARING FOR THE ELECTION THE READER'S DIGEST VERSION E-120 TO ELECTION DAY

The staff of the County Clerk-Recorder's Office begins preparation for a county wide election at least six months prior to Election Day and after that every day is counted as E- the number of days left. You could ask any employee in our office (and probably any candidate) how many days until the election and we won't even have to think twice to answer. Some of the important dates and the activities surrounding them are:

E minus number	Date	Activity
E-113	July 16	Opening of the nomination period.
E- 110	August 9	Initial letters sent to potential precinct workers for commitments to work on election day.
E-88	August 10	Close of the nomination period. After the close of nomination, the ballot layout and preparation begins. Proofing of the sample ballots and ballot information continues through early September.
E-60	September 7	60 day close. This is the initial target date for ensuring that the voter rolls are as updated as possible. Any voter registration in our office by that date is processed into the system and all changes and deletes are accomplished before officially closing our files. The 60 day close file is sent to the Secretary of State and the printer who prepares and mails San Luis Obispo County sample ballots. These names are on the list for the first mailing of state ballot pamphlets and sample ballot pamphlets. Any changes or anyone who registers between this date and the 29 day close of registration (October 9) will be mailed the voter information in the second mailing, scheduled for mailing the week of October 15.
E- 56 to E-14	September 10- October 23	Write-in candidate nomination period. (applies only to the Presidential and non-partisan contests)
E-44	September 24	Assignment letters to precinct workers that have been assigned to polling places.
E-40	September 27	Sample Ballot booklets are mailed to voters who

		have not signed up to be a permanent vote-by-mail voter or do not live in a mail ballot precinct.
E-43 to E-20	September 24- October 17	Testing of voting machines and ballot counting software. Testing for transmission of results to the Secretary of State.
E-29	October 9 (October 8th is a holiday)	The “informed voter” close of registration as well as the first day to issue vote-by-mail ballots. Vote-by-mail ballots are mailed to the over 82,000 voters who are signed up as permanent VBM voters and to those who live in mail ballot precincts. During the week of the close of registration, staff is busy processing voter registrations. These must be completed by the end of the week so new voters can be sent their sample ballot booklets and state voter information guides in a timely manner. While this is going on the voting booths and precinct supplies are being prepared for delivery to the county’s 135 precincts and last minute changes to precinct worker assignments are made. During the month of October, staff is conducting 14 training sessions for the 1200+ volunteers working at the polls.
E-15	October 22	Official close of registration. Anyone registered between October 9 and October 22 is eligible to vote however, the voter will not receive the state voter information guide or the county sample ballot booklet. The voter will receive a postcard indicating their polling place location and where they can obtain voter information.
E-11	October 26	Elections staff begins opening and preparing the vote-by-mail ballots for counting.
E-10	October 27	Elections staff begins counting the vote-by-mail ballots. No results are released until after the close of polls on Election Night.
E-7	October 30	Copy of ballot counting software is deposited with the Secretary of State.
E-7	October 30	Last day to mail vote-by-mail ballots to voters. After this day, a voter must appear in the office to receive a ballot. The week before the election precinct supplies are distributed to the precinct inspectors.
E-6 to E Day	October 31- November 6	Vote-by-mail ballots can be requested in person at the Clerk-Recorder’s Office.
E-2	November 4	Delivery crew picks up voting booths, ballot box and other equipment for delivery to polls
E-1	November 5	Delivery crew delivers and sets up voting equipment at 75 polling places throughout the county.
E Day	November 6	Polls are open from 7:00 am to 8:00 pm Election day begins at 6:00 a.m. and should end

		around 1:00 am for the County Clerk-Recorder staff, although final election night results should be completed by 12:30 am
E+1	November 7	Delivery crew picks up and returns all voting equipment to the Elections warehouse. Election staff records number of outstanding vote-by-mail and provisional ballots
E+2	November 8	Official Canvass begins – see process outline below.
E+28	December 4	Official canvass completion and election certification deadline.

ELECTION NIGHT PROCEDURES

After the last voter in line at 8:00 p.m. has cast their ballot, the precinct workers pack up and return precinct materials and the voted ballots in sealed containers to either the regional collection centers or directly to the Elections office in San Luis Obispo. Elections staff verifies that all ballots and required materials have been received and that security measures have been followed prior to releasing the precinct workers. All ballots and materials are brought to the Government Center in San Luis Obispo for ballot counting and secure storage.

SPEED OF BALLOT COUNTING ELECTION NIGHT

As in the past, results of early vote-by-mail ballots (those received by Saturday, November 3rd) will be available immediately after the polls close at 8:00 pm. All ballots voted at the polls will be counted centrally in the County Clerk-Recorder’s office on Election night. The ballots will be transported from our regional collection centers in Paso Robles, Atascadero, Morro Bay and Arroyo Grande to the Government Center for counting. The staff of the Clerk-Recorder’s office is assisted in this endeavor by over 20 employees from other departments. The time it takes to count the ballots will depend on the Election Day turnout, however final unofficial election night results should be available by 12:30 a.m.

INCOMPLETE BALLOT COUNTING ELECTION NIGHT

The public is often surprised on the day after a major election when they learn that there are as many as 15,000 – 25,000 ballots county wide remaining to be counted after the election. There are three categories of ballots which cannot be processed on Election Night:

1. **VOTE-BY-MAIL BALLOTS TURNED IN ELECTION DAY-** Many vote-by-mail voters wait until Election Day to make their voting choices and then drop off their ballots at a polling place. These ballots are received after the polls close on election night. All vote-by-mail ballots must be pre-processed before they are counted- including entering that the ballot has been returned to protect against double voting and verifying the voter's signature against the signature on file in our office.
2. **PROVISIONAL BALLOTS-** Provisional Ballots are voted at the polls when the precinct workers cannot determine the voter's eligibility to vote in that election. Provisional ballots are sealed in special envelopes and must be individually researched and verified at the County Clerk-Recorder's Office before the ballot is counted or rejected in accordance with election laws. There are several reasons

why someone would be required to vote a provisional ballot at the polling location:

- Voter is listed as having received a vote-by-mail ballot but does not have the ballot to surrender at the polls.
- Voter is voting under the fail safe provisions of the National Voting Rights Act. A fail safe voter is a registered voter in this county, who has moved and did not re-register to vote or notify the elections office of his/her change of address.
- Voter's name is not on the roster, but the voter insists they are eligible to vote in that precinct.
- Voter is required to show identification as a first time voter under the Help America Vote Act and cannot produce the required identification.

In each of these instances, the elections staff must verify that the voter is eligible to vote the ballot they were issued and verify the voter's signature prior to opening the ballot for processing. The number of provisional ballots continues to climb and in the November 2008 election there were 3,716 provisional ballots requiring about 400 hours of staff time to verify, open and count.

3. **DAMAGED BALLOTS:** Election Day ballots that are unable to be processed by the ballot scanners because of stray marks, overvotes or tears. These ballots need to be duplicated prior to counting.

The majority of the vote-by-mail ballots are counted by the Friday after the election. Some of these ballots require additional processing and their count is completed in the week following the election. The provisional and damaged ballots are normally counted just prior to certification of the results. Results are released as a count is completed and a schedule of counting dates and times will be posted on the County Clerk-Recorder website after the election.

WRAPPING UP THE ELECTION WHAT IS THE OFFICIAL CANVASS?

The election canvass process is an internal audit required by state law to ensure the accuracy of election results. California election law allows 28 days to conduct the official canvass of final election results. The official canvass begins on Thursday, November 8 and must be concluded within 28 days, no later than December 4. San Luis Obispo County normally completes the official canvass within 17 days of the election. All aspects of the canvass are open to the public. The canvass concludes with the certification and issuance of official election results. Listed below are the major components of the official canvass. The progress of the canvass and the ballots remaining to be counted are updated on the Clerk-Recorder website - www.slovote.com

Completion of the count for vote-by-mail and provisional ballots- as described above.

Election Materials accounted for- Staff verifies that all elections materials have been returned and accounted for and that precinct workers have correctly followed Election Day

procedures.

Roster Reconciliation- Following the close of the polls on Election Day, precinct officers are responsible for completing the Official Ballot Statement shown below.

As part of the official canvass, the signatures in each roster are re-counted and the number of signatures indicated by the inspector on the roster is compared to the number of ballots tabulated by the computer tally system. Any discrepancies are investigated. The balancing process normally takes 10 days to complete, depending on the Election Day turnout.

Manual Vote Tally- All voted ballots from at least 2 precincts (1% of the 135 precincts) are manually tallied for every contest and balanced against the computer counts to verify the accuracy of the election tally system. For any contest which is not on the ballot in one of those two precincts, an additional precinct's ballots are tallied for that contest only. In addition, this same procedure is completed for 1% of the vote-by-mail ballots. The completion of the manual tally usually takes 2-4 days, depending on the number of contests on the ballot and the voter turnout.

Apply Voting History- All voters who voted at the polls are given credit for voting.

Account for all ballots- The number of precinct and vote-by-mail ballots printed, issued and unvoted are accounted for and balanced. Discrepancies are investigated.

Prepare and print the Statement of Vote- The statement of vote displays the poll and vote-by-mail votes for all candidates and measures by precinct. In a general election, due to the large number of contests, the statement of vote often exceeds 1500 pages. The official summary report and statement of vote is posted on the website in PDF format.

Certify Election and report to the Secretary of State - Registrar of Voters certifies the Election and sends the certification, statement of vote and supplemental statement of vote

to the Secretary of State. Board item is prepared to present to the Board of Supervisors.

Issue certificates of elections to candidates- Provide each elected candidate with a certificate of election and oath of office, which must be subscribed to prior to the candidate taking office. Provide each City Clerk with the results of all votes cast for candidates and any measures. Provide each district with results of all votes cast for any measures.

There are some interesting trends:

- ◇ Overall, voter registration has decreased by 2,471 voters or 1.6%. Although we do expect the registration numbers to be close to 160,000 by the close of registration on October 22.
- ◇ The number voters who have selected the Democratic Party has decreased by 3,834 or 7%.
- ◇ The number voters who have selected the Republican Party has decreased by 2,4855 or 4%. 
- ◇ The number of voters who have chosen to not state a party preference or are registered with a party that is not qualified for the ballot in California has increased by 3,286 or 11%.

WHAT'S NEW FOR THIS ELECTION

Top Two “Voter-Nominated” Candidates

What is it?

In 2010, California voters approved Proposition 14 creating the “Top-Two Primary,” which replaced the traditional party-nominated primary. Only the candidates who receive the highest and second-highest number of votes cast during the Primary election advance to the General election. Write-in candidates are no longer allowed for these contests during the General election. The new rules apply to U.S. Senate, U.S. Congressional, statewide and state legislative offices. The rules for non-partisan contests (i.e. counties, cities, school and special districts) did not change.

Party Preference and Political Party Endorsement

The term “party preference” is now used in place of the term “party affiliation”. On the ballot, the political party preference, or no party preference, as indicated on the candidate’s voter registration is listed next to or below the candidate’s name. The party designation is shown on the ballot for the information of the voters only and it does not constitute or imply an endorsement by the party designated. Parties may provide a list of candidates who have received the official endorsement of the party for printing in this booklet.

“To update classrooms with modern computers/technology; replace portable classrooms; expand vocational education facilities including welding, engineering, medical/science technology, and construction trades; and renovate, upgrade, equip, acquire and construct classrooms/school facilities throughout the District; shall Templeton Unified School District be authorized to issue \$35,000,000 of bonds with interest rates below legal limits, an independent citizen oversight committee, no money for administrator salaries, and all funds spent locally and not taken by the State and spent elsewhere?”

Bond proceeds will be expended to modernize, replace, renovate, construct, acquire, equip, rebuild and furnish the District's facilities as described in the following list. Whenever specific items are included in the following list, they are presented to provide an example and are not intended to limit the generality of the broader description of authorized projects.

The facilities and improvements to be financed by the bonds issued for the District include the modernization, replacement, renovation, construction, acquisition, equipping, furnishing, and other improvements to the District's schools and facilities.

Such projects shall include:

- Installation and upgrading of electrical systems to improve student access to computers and modern technology
- Removal and replacement of portable classrooms
- Repair and expansion of District's vocational education facilities (welding, engineering, medical and science technology, and construction trades)
- Repair and replacement of deteriorating roofs
- Construction, repair, renovation, acquisition, furnishing, equipping and/or remodeling of facilities and classrooms throughout the District
- Upgrading and replacing outdated heating, ventilation, and air-conditioning (HVAC) systems
- Installation and improvement of energy cost saving system throughout the District
- Improvements to schools' pick-up and drop-off areas and addition of additional parking to increase student safety and reduce traffic congestion
- Upgrading and improving playgrounds, playfields and equipment throughout the District
- Replacement or installation of security features such as fencing, cameras, or lighting systems

Approval of the District's bond measure does not guarantee that the Projects that are the subject of the measure will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by the bond measure. The District's proposed Projects may assume the receipt of state funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approved at a statewide bond measure.

Additionally, the Templeton Unified School District shall establish a Citizen's Oversight Committee (the "Committee") and will appoint the members of the Committee to be made up of a minimum of seven members comprised of at least the following: one member shall be active in a business organization representing the business community located within the District, one member shall be active in a senior citizens' organization, one member shall be active in a bona fide taxpayer's organization, one member shall be the parent or guardian of a child enrolled in the District, one member shall be both a parent or guardian of a child enrolled in the District and active in a parent-teacher organization. The District shall cause the proceeds of the Bonds to be deposited in a separate account. The District shall annually cause to be prepared financial and performance audits related to the expenditure of the Bond proceeds to ensure funds have only been expended on the specific Projects listed. The District shall also cause an annual report to be prepared by the District's Chief Business Official, containing a status report of all the authorized Projects and containing the amount of funds collected and expended.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE H-12

This measure will determine whether the Templeton Unified School District shall issue \$35 million in bonds for the purpose of improving school and education facilities within the District.

California Constitution, Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3), authorizes the District to incur bonded indebtedness for the purpose of financing the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, in accordance with certain accountability requirements, upon approval of 55% of the voters voting on the measure.

If approved, this measure will allow the District to issue up to \$35 million in bonds, at an interest rate not to exceed the statutory limit permitted by law. The bonds may be issued pursuant to Government Code section 54400 or Education Code section 15144, which carry different maximum terms that the bonds or any series of bonds may run. The proceeds of the bonds shall be used for the purpose of replacing portable classrooms; expanding vocational education facilities; and renovating, equipping, acquiring, and constructing classrooms and other school facilities throughout the District.

The bonds and interest will be financed by ad valorem taxes levied annually on taxable real property within the District, and will be in addition to the property taxes currently levied within the District. The District's Tax Rate Statement, which accompanies this analysis, reflects an estimate of the maximum property tax levies required to service the bonds.

The measure includes the following accountability provisions:

1. A list of the specific facilities projects to be funded and certification that the District Board has evaluated safety, class size reduction and information technology needs in developing that list.
2. That the proceeds from the bond sale shall be used only for the purposes listed in the measure and not for any other purpose. (The statement of the proposition on the ballot indicates that the proceeds will not be used for administrator's salaries, as required by Article III A, Section 1(b)(3)(A).)
3. That the District Board will conduct an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the funds have been spent only on the specific facilities projects listed in the measure.
4. That the District Board will conduct an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds until all of such proceeds from the sale of the bonds have been spent for the facilities projects listed in the measure.
5. That the District will maintain the bond sale proceeds in a separate account and shall cause a report to be filed in accordance with Government Code section 53411.
6. That the District Board shall establish a citizens' oversight committee to monitor expenditures and to ensure that bond proceeds are used to fund the specific projects listed in the full text of the measure.

"Yes" on this measure is a vote in favor of the issuance of \$35 million in bonds to be used for improving the District's school facilities.

"No" on this measure is a vote against the issuance of \$35 million in bonds to be used for improving the District's school facilities.

An election will be held in the Templeton Unified School District (the "District") on November 6, 2012, to authorize the sale of up to \$35,000,000 in bonds of the District to continue improving the quality of education in local schools. Specifically, bond proceeds shall be utilized for the purposes of increasing student computer/technology access; expanding vocational education facilities; and acquiring, construction and modernizing classrooms and school facilities throughout the District.

If the bonds are authorized and sold, debt service thereon will be payable from the proceeds of tax levies made upon the taxable property in the District. The following information is provided in compliance with Sections 9400-9404 of the Elections Code of the State of California.

1. The best estimate of the tax which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue during the first fiscal year after the sale of the first series of bonds, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is 6¢ per \$100 (\$60.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation in fiscal year 2013 - 2014.
2. The best estimate of the tax which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue during the first fiscal year after the sale of the last series of bonds, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is 6¢ per \$100 (\$60.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation in fiscal year 2019 - 2020.
3. The best estimate of the highest tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is 6¢ per \$100 (\$60.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation in fiscal year 2013 - 2014.
4. The best estimate of the average tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue during the life of the bonds, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is 6¢ per \$100 (\$60.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation.

Voters should note that the estimated tax rates are based on the *ASSESSED VALUE* of taxable property on the County's official tax rolls, *not* on the property's market value. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

Attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon the District's projections and estimates only, which are not binding upon the District. The actual tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary from those presently estimated, due to variations from these estimates in the timing of bond sales, the amount of bonds sold and market interest rates at the time of each sale, and actual assessed valuations over the term of repayment of the bonds. The dates of sale and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on the need for construction funds and other factors, including the legal limitations on bonds approved by a 55% vote. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each sale. Actual future assessed valuation will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE I-12**

City of Grover Beach Changing from a General Law City to a Charter City

Introduction. Measure I-12 asks voters if the City of Grover Beach should be changed from a General Law City to a Charter City. Of California's 482 cities, approximately 25% are governed by charters, including locally San Luis Obispo, Santa Maria, and Solvang. Measure I-12 would convert Grover Beach from a general law to a charter city. The charter would be the City's Constitution and allow the City to control its municipal affairs without interference from the State Legislature. Municipal affairs include election procedures, bidding for contracts, and rules for use of City property. The City would remain subject to state laws on matters of statewide concern. Matters of statewide concern include open meeting and public records, environmental protection, and bargaining with employee associations.

Key Provisions.

Sections 100 and 101 provide the City all powers over municipal affairs a charter city can legally have.

Section 200 preserves the existing Council-Manager form of government and Section 202 preserves the current elected offices: 5 Council Members (including a Mayor and Vice Mayor) and establishes a minimum six-month residency requirement for all candidates. Section 202 limits Council Members' pay to what state law allows for general law cities and states no Council Member may receive a pension or unemployment insurance. Section 203 says elections will continue to be governed by state law and protects voter powers of initiative, referendum, and recall.

Section 300 requires the City to promote economic and community development and to preserve Grover Beach's beach-town character. Section 301 exempts the City from provisions of the California Public Contract Code as it pertains to purchasing of goods and services and bidding processes on public works, allowing the Council to set the rules and regulations for those processes. Section 302 exempts it from prevailing wages for construction projects, unless state or federal law or the City Council requires otherwise. Section 303 allows a limited bid advantage for local businesses. Section 304 supports the use of volunteers to build community projects. Section 305 states adoption of the charter will give the City no new power to impose taxes and fees. State law will require voter approval for all new taxes and many new fees.

Sections 400 and 401 are intended to protect Grover Beach's revenues from the State.

Section 501 allows for unlimited General Plan amendments per year, abolishing the limit of three under state law.

If approved by Grover Beach's voters, the Charter will take effect when filed with the Secretary of State and only voters of Grover Beach can amend or repeal it. The proposed charter and more information are available at <http://www.grover.org>.

These cost savings are being used by those cities and public agencies to complete other projects that were on hold because they lacked funding. If approved by a majority of the voters voting on the measure, this measure would authorize a one-half of one percent sales tax within the City of Paso Robles. This sales tax would be a "general tax," meaning that revenues raised from the tax would go into the City's general fund to fund any lawful City program, improvement, or service. The City would not be required to use the revenues raised by the measure for any special purpose or for any particular program or service.

California Revenue and Taxation Code section 7285.9 authorizes the City of Paso Robles to levy a transactions and use tax (sales tax) at a rate of one-half of one percent so long as the tax is approved by two-thirds of the City Council and a majority of the voters voting in an election on that issue. If approved, the sales tax would become effective on April 1, 2013.

The tax would be paid in addition to current sales taxes and would be collected at the same time and in the same manner as existing sales taxes. All revenues raised by the tax would belong to the City and would not be shared with any other entity.

This sales tax would automatically sunset and be repealed 12 years after its effective date and could not be collected after that time unless a majority of the voters voting in an election approve an extension or re-authorization of the tax.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE E-12

A program of regular road repair and maintenance costs over \$3 million per year. A temporary supplemental one-half percent sales tax would provide that amount every year for 12 years. And, while other vital city services can be addressed, road repair is so expensive that supplemental income is needed to do it effectively.

Historically, gasoline taxes provided \$400,000 per year for road maintenance. The State took these funds for the last several years during the recession to balance its own budget. When or if the State will take the funds again is unknown at this time. Additionally, since 2008, the City's income dropped \$7,000,000 per year. Even so, the budget has been balanced - by eliminating 35% of City jobs, freezing pay, and renegotiating pensions - but there is not enough revenue to restore major City services or improvements.

The temporary one-half percent sales tax is a simple way to help restore major City services, with tourists and non-residents helping to pay for them. The money cannot be taken away by the State. Since it is a temporary tax, it would address immediate, one-time needs, rather than recurring obligations like additional staff or salaries. And, importantly, use of the money would be guided by voter preferences as recorded through an advisory measure (on this ballot) and by a citizen's tax oversight committee.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE F-12**

Measure F-12 is an advisory measure concerning the recommended expenditure of new City of Paso Robles sales tax revenues if Measure E-12, which is on this ballot, is approved by the voters.

Measure F-12 does not increase taxes. Rather, Measure F-12 asks voters whether they believe the additional sales tax revenues, if Measure E-12 is approved, should be used primarily for the purpose of repairing and maintaining the City's roadways. If a majority of the voters vote "yes," on this measure, it will be an indication to the City Council of how voters believe the revenues should be spent. IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE D-12**

Since 1972, the City of San Luis Obispo has imposed a 5% Utility Users Tax (UUT) on telephone, electricity, gas, water, and cable users within the City. The tax has been charged regularly by service providers and remitted to the City as provided by Municipal Code, Chapter 3.16. This City Council proposed Measure D-12 would replace the City's current UUT ordinance with a revised ordinance that: 1) reduces the City's current tax rate for telecommunications and cable/video users from 5% to 4.8%; 2) maintains the City's current tax rate of 5% for electricity, gas, and water users; 3) modernizes the language of the ordinance for clarity; 4) updates and expands definitions to address dramatic changes in telecommunications and video services technologies that have emerged since the current ordinance was adopted; 5) ensures uniform application of the video and telecommunications tax, regardless of the means of transmission or technology used; and 6) ensures the Telecommunications User's Tax is in compliance with current federal laws to avoid potential litigation.

The most significant changes proposed measure D-12 are to the telecommunications and video users tax provisions. Like most older UUT ordinances in California, the City's telephone UUT provisions defined the scope of the tax on telephone users partially by reference to the Federal Excise Tax (FET) (26 USC §4251). An IRS ruling in 2006 stated that the FET does not apply to most common billing plans currently in use, such as "one-rate" plans (which provide a mix of local and long-distance calling for a flat rate or fixed fee for unlimited dialing). The ruling did not prohibit cities from continuing to impose telecommunication taxes more broadly than the Federal government's interpretation of the FET. However, the ruling did create uncertainty regarding the continuation of longstanding tax practices and expanded application to new technologies of taxes, like the City's, which include an FET reference. One result of the ambiguity created has been significant litigation challenging the application of UUT ordinances with language similar to the City's ordinance. Many cities have sought voter approval of revised ordinances, like Measure D-12, to avoid potential lawsuits that could limit the continued collection of telecommunications UUT revenues.

The City's 1972 ordinance was written before new telecommunication technologies, like "smart" phones or Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP), and new video technologies, like internet protocol TV and Video, became available. The proposed measure would encompass current technologies and allow the City's ordinance to remain current with evolving communications and video technologies. The tax would apply uniformly to all users of video and communications services, regardless of the means of transmission or technology used. The telecommunications UUT would not apply to charges for internet access or digital downloads, such as books, ringtones, games and similar products.

Measure D-12 requires approval of a majority of voters. A "yes" vote is a vote to adopt the revised UUT Ordinance. A "no" vote is a vote to reject the proposed UUT Ordinance, and continue the UUT in its current form.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE D-12

Measure D is needed to modernize San Luis Obispo's current Utility Users Tax ("UUT") in response to changes in federal law, and advances in technology – and at the same time, actually lower the tax rate for users of new technology, from 5% to 4.8%.

Measure D sustains a vital revenue stream: San Luis Obispo's current UUT, enacted in 1973, is outdated. It has provided steady and reliable local revenue vital to our high standard of municipal service.

Measure D keeps up with new technologies: The original UUT was enacted at a time when communication technology was much simpler, and only covered intrastate, landline telephones. While cell phone and landlines are covered by the existing ordinance, newer technologies are not. Measure D does not tax Internet use.

Measure D assures equitable taxation: Measure D will ensure that everyone pays a fair tax, regardless of which telecommunication technology they use. It updates our current UUT so that all San Luis Obispo residents and businesses pay their fair share, regardless of the type of communication technology they choose.

Measure D is not a new tax. Our current rate of 5% (well below the State average of 6%) would still apply to water, electricity and gas users, but would be lowered to 4.8% for users of telecommunications and video services.

The City cannot risk losing this revenue. The UUT provides nearly \$5 million for vital City services, like fire and police protection, emergency medical response, parks, play grounds, athletic fields, and recreational programs.

San Luis Obispo needs to join other media-savvy cities and keep up with changing technology by modernizing our UUT and lowering the rate applied to newer technologies. Please join your neighbors, community leaders and City Council members in support of Measure D.

**OCEANO COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT
IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE B-12**

This measure will determine whether the Board of Directors of the Oceano Community Services District ("the Board") shall be required to hold an election prior to the sale of any water to an entity residing outside of the jurisdictional boundaries of the Oceano Community Services District ("OCSD").

This measure is proposed by an initiative petition. The statement of the measure indicates that one primary purpose of the measure is to provide the OCSD rate payers with the right to be fully informed about water supply contracts which may affect the water supply available to the OCSD, and to provide the rate payers with the right to vote on water sales that may affect their future.

Approval of the measure would enact an ordinance requiring that an election be held prior to any permanent sale of water to any entity residing outside the jurisdictional boundaries of the OCSD. The ordinance will require that all details of any proposed sale, including impacts to Oceano, shall be presented in a report prepared by a registered water engineer and a certified public accountant. Under the terms of the measure, the report must be mailed to every registered voter residing in the District no later than 60 days prior to the election.

The measure does not specify the exact question that shall be posed to the voters of the District if an election is required by the measure. From the stated purpose, County Counsel presumes that the question would be something to the following effect: Whether the Board of the OCSD shall sell water to [a specific entity], which entity resides outside of the jurisdictional boundaries of the OCSD.

The OCSD has three sources of water supply: ground water; water received from Lake Lopez, which is governed by a contract with the San Luis Obispo Flood Control and Water Conservation District (SLOFCWCD); and state water, which is also governed by a contract between the SLOFCWCD and the OCSD. It is unclear from the measure whether the measure is intended to apply to all water supply sources. If so, the measure may conflict with provisions of those contracts governing the authority of the OCSD to sell water outside of the boundaries of the OCSD.

The measure may be subject to legal challenge on one or more grounds, including that it is beyond the power of the electorate to enact because the legislature has delegated to community services district governing boards the power to sell water and, additionally, because the matter of who or which entity the OCSD may contract with to sell water is an administrative matter not within the initiative power of the voters.

A "Yes" vote on this measure is a vote in favor of requiring that an election be held prior to any permanent sale of water to any entity outside the OCSD.

A "No" vote on this measure is a vote against requiring that an election be held prior to any permanent sale of water to any entity outside the OCSD.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE C-12**

ORDINANCE NO. 2012- 02

CALLING FOR AN ELECTION WITHIN THE CAYUCOS FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT ("DISTRICT"), SAN LUIS OBISPO COUNTY, FOR THE PURPOSES OF SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE DISTRICT THE PROPOSITION FOR REPEALING THE PRIOR SPECIAL TAX AND APPROVING A NEW SPECIAL TAX FOR FIRE PROTECTION, FIRE PREVENTION AND OTHER FIRE DEPARTMENT SERVICES RELATED TO THE PROTECTION OF LIVES AND PROPERTY WITHIN THE DISTRICT

Section 1: Imposition of Special Tax. Except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance, a new special tax to fund fire prevention and protection services is hereby imposed on every parcel of land within the Cayucos Fire Protection District (District). The tax shall be imposed each fiscal year by the District Board of Directors to furnish adequate fire prevention, fire protection, and other services as provided in Section 2 of this Ordinance. The tax imposed by this Ordinance shall be a tax upon each parcel of property, and the tax shall not be measured by the value of the property.

Section 2: Special Tax Purpose. The proceeds of the Special Tax imposed by this Ordinance shall be placed in a special fund for the purposes of obtaining, furnishing, operating and maintaining fire department equipment and/or apparatus, real property and facilities, for fire protection services, rescue services, emergency medical services, and other services, including training, relating to the protection of lives and property, for paying salaries and benefits to District personnel and for no other purpose.

Section 3: Special Tax Account. A special account shall be created in which the proceeds of the Special Tax shall be deposited.

Section 4: Special Tax Report. The District's Chief Financial Officer shall file an annual report with the District Board of Directors no later than January 1 of the year following the election and at least once a year thereafter, containing both of the following:

- A. The amount of the funds collected and expended; and
- B. The status of any projects or services authorized to be funded as identified in Section 2 of this Ordinance.

Section 5: Special Tax Amount. Subsequent to the end of each fiscal year, but prior to August tenth of the ensuing fiscal year, the Board of Directors at a public hearing, after considering public input, shall determine the precise amount of the Special Tax to be levied during the ensuing fiscal year, provided that such Special Tax will not exceed the maximum amount set forth in Section 6 below without the approval of two-thirds of the voters of the District voting on the question.

Section 6: Maximum Tax Amounts. The maximum amount of the tax imposed on each parcel of real property within the District pursuant to this Ordinance shall be determined as follows:

- A. Commencing fiscal year 2013/2014 a maximum special tax rate of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) per unit of benefit shall be imposed on each parcel in accordance with the following schedule to be adjusted each year thereafter not to exceed the increase authorized in sub-section B. below:

Example: As an example, a residential single family dwelling would be assessed four (4) benefit units at \$25.00 per unit for a total of \$100.00 in the tax year 2013/2014.

- B. Commencing fiscal year 2014-2015 and each fiscal year thereafter, the special tax amounts specified by sub-section A above may be increased by the percentage by which the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers in the Los Angeles-Anaheim-Riverside area published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U.S. Department of Labor, or any successor to that index, increases in the twelve months prior to March of the year in which the adjustment is made. The District Fire Chief shall annually recalculate the maximum tax amounts pursuant to this sub-section B. and shall give notice of that determination to the District Board of Directors.

Section 7: Exemptions.

A. To the extent required by California and Federal law the following parcels shall be exempt from the tax imposed by this Ordinance:

1. Parcels owned by federal or state governmental agencies;
2. Parcels owned by local governmental agencies;
3. Parcels exempt from taxation by the District pursuant to the laws or constitutions of the United States and the State of California.

B. Any person or entity claiming an exemption from the tax imposed by this Ordinance shall file a verified statement of exemption on a form prescribed by the fire Chief prior to June 30th of the first fiscal year for which the exemption is sought.

Section 8. Administration and Appeals. The District Fire Chief shall administer this Ordinance. Appeals of any determination of the Fire Chief shall be submitted in writing to the District Secretary not later than July 1st of the fiscal year for which the tax is imposed. The District Board of Directors shall consider the appeal and issue a decision to the appellant in writing.

Section 9. Amendment of Ordinance. The District Board of Directors is hereby authorized to amend this Ordinance for the purpose of carrying out the general purposes of this Ordinance, to conform the provisions of this Ordinance to applicable state law, to permit the County Tax Collector or another public official to collect the Special Tax levied by this Ordinance in conjunction with County taxes, or to re-assign the duties of public officials under this Ordinance. In no event, however, may the District Board of Directors alter the provisions of Sections 5 or 6, of this Ordinance without the approval of two-thirds of the voters of the District voting on the question.

Section 10. Special Tax Election. Pursuant to the provisions of the Election Code and District Resolution 2012-02, it is ordered that this Special Tax Election be conducted pursuant to the uniform District Election Law commencing with Election Code § 10500 on November 6, 2012.

- 1) Section 11. Consolidation of Special Tax Election. Pursuant to § 1055 of the Election Code and District Resolution 2012-02, it is ordered that the Special Tax Election be consolidated with such other elections to be held on November 6, 2012 under State law within the territory of the District, and shall be held and conducted, and all other proceedings incidental to and connected with the election, shall be regulated and done, in accordance with the provisions of law regulating regularly scheduled elections. The precincts, polling places for said precincts in the County of San Luis Obispo, and persons appointed and designated to serve as election officers for said election will be those determined, designated, and appointed pursuant to State law by the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk of the County of San Luis Obispo (the "Registrar"). The District, by Resolution, has requested that the election be consolidated with the Statewide Election and that the Registrar conduct the election as well as performs the various other services required by law on behalf of the District. The District has determined the full text of the measure shall be printed in the sample ballot booklet. The full text will also be posted and copies available at the District Office and on the County Clerk-Recorder's website and a copy of the full text will be mailed to any voter upon request.

Section 12. Ballot Question. Pursuant to the California Elections Code, the abbreviated statement of the proposition, as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"Shall Measure C-12 be approved, which repeals the current 1982 Special Tax and imposes a new Special Tax at twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) per unit of benefit, to be adjusted each year thereafter by the change in the consumer

price index, for fire protection, rescue, emergency medical services, and other services relating to the protection of lives and property, and for no other purposes as provided in Ordinance 2012- 02”.

Section 13. Notice of Hearings. In the absence of state law specifying the procedures for giving notice, notice of any public hearing held pursuant to this ordinance shall be given by publishing twice pursuant to Government Code Section 6066 in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation within the District. This notice shall include the date, time, and place of the public hearing, a general explanation of the matter to be considered, and a statement of where additional information may be obtained.

Section 14: Collection of Special Tax. The Special Tax imposed by this ordinance shall be collected by the San Luis Obispo County Tax Collector at the same time as and along with, and shall be subject to the same penalties and appeal process, as property taxes collected by said Tax Collector.

Section 15. Two-Thirds Approval; Effective Date. This Ordinance and the proposed Special Tax Increase shall be effective only if approved by two-thirds (2/3) of the voters voting thereon and shall go into effect ten (10) days after the vote is declared by the District. The new Special Tax, if approved, shall commence with Fiscal Year 2013/2014.

Section 16. Notice of Holding Election. Notice of the time and place of holding the election is given and the District Secretary is authorized, instructed and directed to give further or additional notice of the election, in time, form and manner as required by law.

Section 17. Conduct of Special Tax Election. In all particulars not recited in this Ordinance, the election shall be held and conducted as provided by law for holding Special Tax Elections. The District Secretary shall make this Ordinance readily available for public inspection.

Section 18. Repeal of 1982 Special Tax. Upon approval of this Ordinance as provided in Section 15 above, the 1982 Special Tax shall be repealed in its entirety.

Section 19. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions of this Ordinance shall nonetheless remain in full force and effect.

Section 20. Recitals. That the recitals set forth hereinabove are true, correct and valid.

Section 21. Effective date. This Ordinance and the proposed Special Tax Increase shall be effective only if approved by two-thirds (2/3) of the voters voting thereon and shall go into effect ten (10) days after the vote is declared by the District. The new Special Tax, if approved, shall commence with Fiscal Year 2013/2014.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE C-12

This measure is intended to determine whether the special tax currently levied within the Cayucos Fire Protection District ("District") to fund fire prevention and protection services should be repealed and a new special tax imposed for the purposes stated in the measure.

Article XIII C of the California Constitution authorizes the adoption of a special tax for fire protection services, rescue services, and emergency medical services within the District if approved by two-thirds (2/3's) of the qualified voters voting within the district. The Board of Directors of the District ("the Board") has determined that revenue from an existing special tax, originally adopted and imposed by the District in 1982, to fund fire prevention and protection services is inadequate to fund the present needs of the District for these services. For this reason, the Board has determined that it is in the public's interest and necessity to provide for additional funding through the repeal of the existing tax and the imposition of a new tax to provide for the funding of fire protection services, rescue services, emergency medical services and other ancillary services related to the protection and preservation of lives and property within the District.

In accordance with Article XIII C, Section 2(d), of the California Constitution, the special tax authorized by this measure will be imposed only if two-thirds (2/3's) of the qualified voters voting on the measure approve it. If the measure is approved, the existing special tax will be repealed and, commencing fiscal year 2013-2014, a new special tax shall be imposed. The tax to be imposed shall not exceed the annual rate of twenty-five dollars (\$25) per benefit unit based on real property land use, and may be increased annually thereafter only in accordance with increases in the consumer price index, as provided in the measure. The number of units of benefit applicable to the real property subject to the proposed new tax is set forth in the full text of the measure. In accordance with the terms of the measure, the Board will determine the precise amount of the tax to be levied during each ensuing fiscal year, provided that the tax shall not exceed the maximum authorized by the measure. If the measure is approved, the new special tax would be levied annually by the Board, and collected by the San Luis Obispo County Tax Collector in the same manner, along with, at the same time, and will be subject to the same penalties, as other property taxes collected by the Tax Collector.

A "yes" vote on this measure is a vote in favor of repealing an existing tax and imposing a new tax for the purposes of providing fire protection and prevention services within the District.

A "no" vote on this measure is a vote against repealing an existing tax and imposing a new tax for the purposes of providing fire protection and prevention services within the District.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE C-12

The highest function of local Cayucos Fire Department is to provide life safety and fire protection to the people and property owners of Cayucos. This, of course, requires adequate funding to supply the necessary equipment and personnel to address emergencies. A yes vote will enable your local district to continue to provide those immediate need services, be they fire or medical.

In 1982 the voters of Cayucos passed (with well over 2/3 majority) a "Special Tax" to fund the continued operation of the fire department. Now, over 30 years later, we find the need to request additional funding. We have been faced with not only a lot of inflation based increases but also the need to augment our paid-call volunteer personnel with a value driven contract with Cal Fire for full time staffing of their Cayucos station. We have had to rely on District cash reserves to pay for the Cal Fire services delivered.

Timely response to an emergency is our highest priority and utilizing Cal Fire, to provide the additional personnel necessary, has been a cost-effective measure to offset our volunteers not being available 24-7.

Due to the financial constraints we are also faced with an equipment replacement problem. We have needs to replace an engine and a rescue/utility vehicle immediately. We have foregone those replacements to insure adequate trained personnel can respond to an incident.

This Board has reviewed alternative staffing and administrative possibilities, the least of which would double the cost this measure requests. Please vote YES on ballot measure C-12.
